Improvement in Futures at Liverpool and Chicago.

Talk of Crop Damage — Big Argentine and Uruguay Crops Assumed—Small Increase in Visible Supply—Wheat and Flour on Passage—Stocks at Toronto—Notes.

Monday Evening, March 20. Liverpool wheat futures partially recovered to-day and closed 1/4 to 3/4 per cent higher than Saturday's final quotation. Paris wheat to-day closed steady to 5 centimes above Saturday's close and Paris flour advanced 20 to 30 centimes.

Chicago wheat futures opened this morning nearly half a cent higher than Saturday's close, the cable advices being stronger and there being no other crop news.

The Corn Trade News makes the world's available supply during the last week were 153,513 barrels flour and 3,233,419 bushels wheat, as compared with 226,187 barrels flour and 4,491,141 bushels wheat in a corresponding week of last year.

The April condition of winter wheat, as per reports of Washington Department of Agriculture, was: In 1898, 857, 18,877, 81,1; in 1897, 77,1. According to general opinion of trade journals, the present average condition is about 80 per cent.

Big Argentine Crop. The correspondent of the Northwestern Miller, writing from Argentina on Feb. 24, says that receipts of the new wheat crop have been delayed by protracted harvest weather. The crop is a large one and a great deal of the wheat is damp and keeps back business; that with gold at 21 1/2, wheat is quoted at 100 kilos (equal to 15.50 per bushel), as compared with 88.25 (82.25 per bushel) 100 kilos last year, when it was quoted 256. He says that the crop in the adjoining provinces of Uruguay was a failure, probably 300,000 tons of fairly good quality. This is the largest crop ever produced in Argentina since 1880.
