ROUTE OF THE BIG PARADE.

What Walter C. Kelly Says About the Pucky Little Feather-weight.

Everything is now in order for the reception to Champion John L. Scholes on his return from the field of battle covered with glory. The big parade will be formed in line at the Union Depot at 7.40 p.m. The champion's father will go to Hamilton this morning. The following will be the order and route of the procession: Leaving the station, up Simcoe to King, to Yonge, to Massey Hall, where the concert arranged by his club, the Athenaeum, will be held. The order of the procession will be: Pipes of the 45th, wheeled, A. O. R. Bugle Band, four-in-hand, containing the champion and party, tally-ho and other carriages, containing the Reception Committee and a wheel, followed by the Athenaeum Band and was accompanied by Foresters' Band.

The following from the pen of Walter C. Kelly in The Buffalo Courier shows what they think over there of Canadian athletes: "Canadians probably have a higher degree of appreciation of amateur sport than the people of any other country. This they demonstrate by the manner in which they turn out to witness amateur athletic events of every description. And boxing is not made an exception. On the contrary, the boxing bouts in Toronto are largely patronized, and the boxers are generously applauded for their work."

"There is probably not an athlete to-day in all Canada half so popular as the young John L. Scholes, the clever Toronto boy, who after winning the Canadian feather-weight and lightweight boxing champion, went over to England, and by the finest kind of boxing defeated champions from different countries, including far-away Australia, winning the world's championship in the featherweight class. "Sport lovers all over Canada are enthusiastic over the young man's creditable performance, and his conquests are being the leading topic of discussion across the border."
