GOT THE CARTRIDGES MIXED

Tuscarora Indians Were Giving an
Exhibition of Wild West Life
at Summerville, N.Y.

THREE PERSONS WERE STRUCK.

The Shooting Was Entirely Acci-
dental and of Course No Arrests
Were Made.Rochester, N.Y., July 14.—During the per-
formance at Summerville on Lake Ontario
last night the Tuscarora Indians, who have
been giving a "Wild West" entertainment
there during the week, fired into the crowd
that had assembled to watch their antics
and wounded three people. The injured
were: Joseph E. Marcell, seven shot wounds
in right leg and two in left; Raymond
Brooks, 9 years old, seven shot wounds
in right thigh; Miss Helen Williamson,
wounded in the body and limbs.That part of the program during which
the Indians fire on a log cabin and are fired
on by the occupants, was carried out with-
out a hitch, but when the cabin was fired
and the whites were obliged to fight the at-
tacking party in the open the trouble be-
gan. Suddenly Miss Williamson uttered a
cry and fell to the ground. From a
gun in the hands of the Indians, then young
Marcell tripped over. Much excitement
prevailed for the space of a few minutes.
None of the injured were seriously hurt.
The shooting was entirely accidental, the load-
ed cartridges becoming mixed by mistake
with the regular blanks used at the per-
formance. No arrests were made.

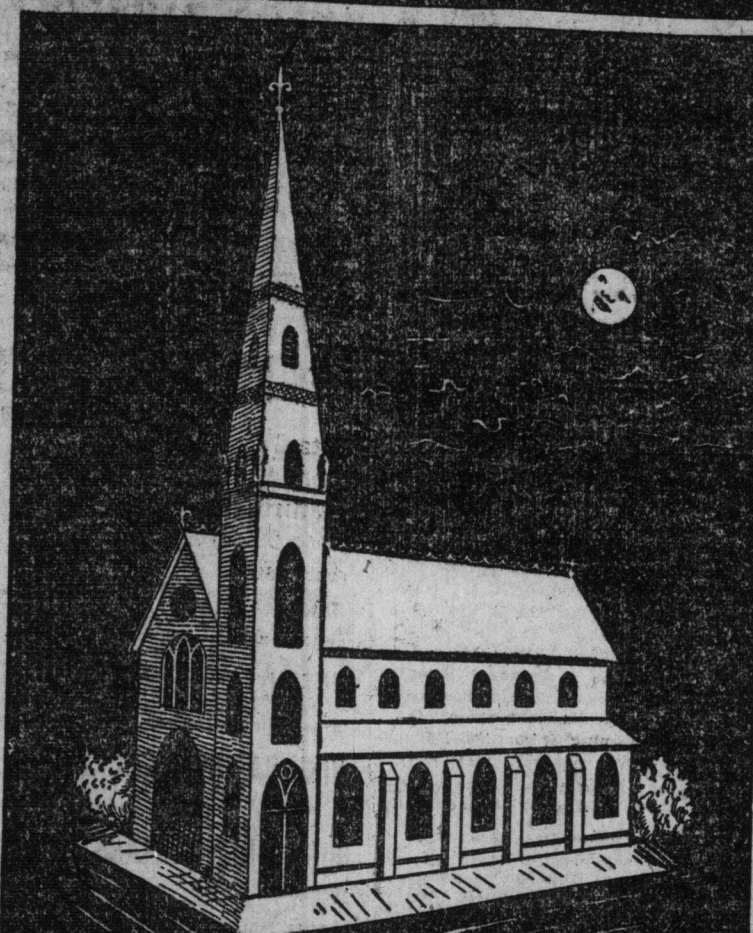
TO GET A PRIVATE TEST.
