Ottawa, April 27.—(Special.)—A summary of the effects of the fire shows as follows for Ottawa and Hull:

Homeless, about 15,000.
Destitute, about 8000.
Thrown out of work by destruction of industries: Ottawa, 3000, Hull, 2500.

Scenes at the Drill Hall. These people were in the hall and no one is shivering his duty. At the Drill Hall today the scenes presented were sad.

Many harrowing tales were told, and in many cases by young married people who had just managed to escape the battle home together, crude, perhaps, but nevertheless true.

A bureau of information has been set up in the City Hall, and in a few days the full particulars of loss will be known.

Ottawa Will Raise \$100,000. At a meeting of the Citizens' Committee to-night with Mayor Payne in the chair the need of raising a large sum for relief was discussed. The first proposition was that the City Council should request the Ontario Government to make a loan of \$100,000, payable in 30 years. This did not meet with general approval and an amendment was moved to make the sum \$75,000, payable in 25 years.

This carried. Mrs. P. D. Ross reported that the local committee of women, which is doing the work of relief stations at Hull and elsewhere.

\$300,000 in Sight. The relief fund is growing every minute. There is in sight \$300,000. Nothing especially of the city of Ottawa's \$100,000 and the Dominion Government's \$100,000. Private subscriptions of \$100 to \$500 have been received already.

Underwriters Meet Monday. The Underwriters' Association of Ottawa will meet to-night to discuss the insurance losses. No fewer than ten prominent insurance agents were seen by The World to-day, but they were wholly unable to figure on their losses. Any prior record of such losses till this meeting must be premature, and in a great measure fanciful.
