CHURCH LIBRARY.

No additions have been made to the Library during the year. The number of those who avail themselves of its use is still comparatively small. This is to be regretted, as there is on its shelves a large number of most excellent works. Mr. David Campbell, the librarian, is in attendance on Wednesday evenings before and after the service.

CHURCH PSALMODY.

To Mr. McLaren, and the members of the Choir, we are, as usual, greatly indebted for their efficient services in connection with our psalmody, and their efforts in this direction are, we are sure, duly appreciated by the Congregation.

In this connection, it may not be out of place to refer to the series of congregational practises inaugurated by our Pastor, and held after the usual Wednesday evening lecture, for the purpose of acquiring a more intimate acquaintance with the tunes in our church hymnal. The large number attending these meetings gave evidence on the part of the congregation that they were alive to the importance of this part of our worship, and the results attained will, it is hoped, lead to a repetition of these practises during a part, at least, of our winter months.

YOUNG MEN'S ASSOCIATION.

After a lapse of some years this society was revived in November last. Its objects, according to its constitution, are declared to be—"The religious, moral and intellectual improvement of its members." In relation to the number of names enrolled, it has thus far had a successful course, but it would be premature to speak yet of success in other respects. If its objects are perseveringly and consistently sought to be realized (and there is no reason to doubt but they will) then the Society will be a powerful auxiliary to the other organizations of the church. All the meetings are opened and closed with prayer. There are readings, essays and
