Story of a Military Conspiracy in Paris Denied.

Interrupted Duel in Connection With the Dreyfus Case Resumed.

New York Journal Man Says Castellane Is a "Fake Count."

London, Dec. 28.-The Paris correspondent of the Daily Mail telegraphs his paper the substance of an interview he has had with Gen. Zurlinden, military governor of Paris, who denied the existence of any military conspiracy against the republic. According to the correspondent, Gen. Zurlinden said: "I believe there is no plot, and that there will be none, because the army is republican to the core. We seek no dictator because the name Napoleon may be dear to our ears, but we are the nation's servants, and our duty is to France. The army, like the majority of the nation, believes that Dreyfus is guilty, but a declaration of his innocence would not induce the army to turn against the republic."

Thirty officers have been arrested. and all sent to four days' imprisonment for subscribing to the funds started by the Libre Parole to enable Mme. Henri to meet the expenses of her contemplated prosecution of M. Joseph Reinach, editor of the Publique Francaise, and Conservative deputy for the district of Digne, for declaring her late husband, Lieut.-Col. Henri, a traitor.

A DUEL.

The duel with swords arising out of the Dreyfus affair between Max Rogis, the anti-Semite mayor of Algiers, and M. Lepic, one of the editors of Les Droits de l'Homme, which was stopped after several vigorous encounters, owing to the swords of the combatants being bent, was resumed yesterday. After three hot encounters M. Lepic was rather severely wounded in the abdomen. Several other duels growing out of the Dreyfus controversy are threatened.

The Paris correspondent of the London Daily News says he has reason to believe that Dreyfus will leave Cayenne, capital of French Guiana, South America, for France, on Jan. 3

next. The premier, M. Dupuy; the minister of war, M. De Freycinet, and the president of the court of cassation, M.Leow, have finally agreed upon the conditions under which the secret documents in the Dreyfus case are to be submitted to the court of cassation. They are be taken there by Capt. Cuignet every morning the court applies for them, and they are to be returned the same night.

IS HE A FAKE COUNT?

The Journal correspondent has had a long conversation with Vicomite de notable as having essayed to prove that most titles borne by French aristocracy are bogus. SIX DUELS.

Buda Pesth, Dec. 28.—The quarrel between Baron Banffy, the Hungarian premier, and M. Horanzsky, member of the lower chamber of the Hungar-ian Diet, is likely to have further curious developments. Although, owing to the inability of their seconds to agree upon the conditions of the proposed duel, the encounter has been declared off, the affair may lead indirectly to several meetings on the field of honor. M. Horanzsky and his seconds having heard that the seconds of Baron Banffy had been animadverting upon the contest of M. Horanzsky, have sent challenges to both. Baron Banffy's seconds are Baron Fejervy, minister of national defense, and M. Gajari, of the Chamber of Deputies. As each has received three challenges, there are six duels being arranged.

FIERCE GALES SWEEP BRITAIN

And Many Wrecks Have Been Reported.

Britain Wants to Buy From Spain the Strip of Territory Opposite Gibraltar.

The Surrender of Iloilo Reported to Have Taken Place.

London, Dec. 28.-A fierce gale on the British coast continues and several wrecks have been reported. An exciting scene was witnessed at the Broadstone. A four-masted schooner. showing distress signals, was seen drifting ashore. A rowboat, with a pilot on board, attempted to reach her, but was unsuccessful. Then a lifeboat attempted to reach the fourmaster, but was unable to do so. Finally tugs succeeded in getting near enough to her to get a tow line to her, and she was towed out of danger. An extraordinary scene is presented along the lower Thames, where the gale is the most severe of any that has occurred since 1873. Hundreds of men are employed in chasing bales, boxes, casks, and articles of every description, which have been blown from the wharves and sent adrift. Many rowboats, barges and other small have been rocked from their moorings and carried away. Some of these were recovered, but four barges were swept out to sea and lost. The general damage done by the storm is very great. Twelve men are missing, and it is reported that they have been drowned.

Vienna, Dec. 28.—Numerous conversions to Protestantism have taken place in Northern Bohemia, the total number, according to report, being 80,000. In a single village 500 persons have adopted the faith. The converts are Germans, whose renouncement of Catholicism is due to their political enthusiasm towards Slavs in Bohemia.

IMPROVED BULLETS. Berlin, Dec. 28.-Dr. E. R. March, the famous army surgeon, has written an article, suggesting that the forthcoming disarmament conference, proposed by Emperor Nicholas, should direct its attentions to mitigating the horrors of war. The writer protests against the use of the dum-dum bullet in civilized warfare, and urges that all narrow calibre bullets should be cased entirely or at least at the point in hard metal. He also insists that every soldier should be instructed in Red Cross

work. THE MAD FAKIR QUITS. London, Dec. 28.-The British authorities have been officially notified that the Mad Fakir has left the Swat Valley, and that all troubles are at an

end. TRAGEDY IN UGANDA. London, Dec. 28.-News has been received of a terrible tragedy which occurred at the end of October at Machakos, in the Uganda protectorate. Capt. Dugmore, late of the royal navy, and an official of the protectorate, owing to the excitement and hardships which he had undergone during the recent Uganda campaign, lost control of his mental faculties, and in a moment of aberration shot Capt. IN ATHENS

Unusual Cold Vexes the Capital at the Helienes.

A Swiss Village Rattled by the Fall of a Mountain.

First Batch of M. Horanszky's Duels

Comes Off,

Athens, Dec. 28.-There are snowdrifts in the streets of this city for the first time in many years. While most Greeks have at least seen snow on the higher mountains, even down in the southern part of the Peloponnesus, only those who live in the hills have much practical experience with it. A fall heavy enough to remain in the streets and form drifts rarely occurs in this city. The wind blew a gale today, and travel was impeded by the drifted snow. Owing to the meager arrangements for heating most dwellings there was really a great deal of suffering

FALL OF A MOUNTAIN.

London, Dec. 28.—Part of Red Rock Airolo, a village of Switzerland, canton of Ticino, has fallen into Airolo, destroying a hotel and several houses. Only three persons were injured. Airolo is a Swiss village at the south end of the St. Gothard railway tunnel. It has a population of about 1,700.
