

TO USE SURPLUS OF **RED TRIANGLE FUND** TO TRAIN VETERANS

Money Will Be Distributed To "Y" Branches For This Purpose.

A considerable money surplus *emaining in the hands of the national council of the Y. M. C. A., representing the unexpended balance of the Red Triangle Fund subscribed for work among the Canadian troops during the war, is to be distributed among the various "Y" branches to be used in educating rebranch, which will apply it to retraining courses for veterans. The schooling, which will be given, will follow the general lines of the D. S. C. R. courses, but will not be only for men who are unable to follow their former occupation owing to disability.

who are unable to follow their former occupation owing to disability.

Instructors will be procured for the courses, which will not be confined to a certain number, but will conform to the wishes of the men as to what courses they wish to take. It is considered too late now to commence the classes this winter, so they will be held over until next fall.

The soldiers will be required to pay a certain deposit on starting the course. If 75 per cent of the lectures are attended the money will be refunded; otherwise 25 per cent of the cost of the training will be charged up to the student.

Commercial and technical classes will be held at night, so that the men will not have to leave their present work to attend the school.

The decision as to the disposition of the fund was reached by the national council after considering the best way of helping the returned man to re-establish himself, as the fund was originally subscribed for him.
