IDENTITY OF WOMAN ARRESTED IN N. Y. **BROUGHT TO LIGHT**

Toronto Woman Alleged To Be a Skillful Shoplifter.

New York, April 7 .- The 60-year-old Toronto woman who was yesterday sentenced in the court of special sessions to 60 days in the workhouse for petty larceny and whose identity mystified police officials, was definitely identified today as Mrs. Frank Coulson rento. Pleading guilty to the theft of articles valued at \$38 from a local department store, Mrs. Coulson yesterday refused to reveal her real name, saying that she had a son who was killed while fighting with the Canadian army in France, and she did not want to bring disgrace upon his memory.

According to Miss Mangin, probation officer, Mrs. Coulson served a term in the Mercer Reformatory in Toronto for shoplifting. Miss Mangin also claims to have learned that Mrs. Coulson acted as go-between in department stores. as go-between in department stores there, aiding saleswomen to steal ar-ticles and receiving her payment in mer-chandise. The records show, according to Miss Mangin's statement, that the woman was arrested in Buffalo for stealing linen from the Hotel Statler. where she was employed, and was fined 30 on that occasion. Her son, who was an elevator man in the same hotel, returned to Toronto at the outbreak of the war and enlisted a Canadian battalion.

He was missing for a year, and was finally reported as dead. For the past three years, Miss Mangin said, Mrs. Coulson has been spending her time visiting friends and relatives, paying no board, but giving them expensive presents.


