## Grant Proposes Radical Changes For Training of Public School Teachers

Would Train All in Normal Schools and Let University Faculties of Education Devote Whole Energies To Turning Out High School Teachers.

(Special to The Advertiser.)

TORONTO, May 3.—Hon. R. H. Grant, minister of education, has under consideration somewhat radical changes in the provisions for training teachers for the higher grades of public school certificates. At present the first-class public school teachers receive their training in the faculties of education. These faculties are charged also with the training of high school assistants. It would appear that this division of effort within the faculties of education has not been in the interest of the province, as the training of high school teachers is a distinct and separate task, and the minister proposes to separate the courses and responsibilities for the professional training of all public school teachers.

These schools are specially organized for this purpose. The teachers have been chosen for their positions because they are men of high academic and professional attainments with approved experience in public school work, and they devote their entire energies to the study of public school methods, and to adapting courses and methods of training to meet these requirements. It is thought, therefore, that public school teachers of all grades can be trained more efficiently and more economically by concentrating the work of instruction in these schools.

The minister has also under consideration plans for widening and strengthening both the theoretical and practical courses in the normal schools. The plans will possibly include pre-school course of study, in Great Britain and the United States the schools for training of teachers provide, almost without exception, for a two-year course, and many offer third and fourth year courses. The urgent need for trained teachers would make it impossible at the present time to extend beyond the present limitations the normal school course for ordinary permanent second-class certificates. But there is a growing demand for teachers with special training for urban and rural schools, and it is probable that the extension of the normal school course will provide advanced training of a specialized character for these purposes. It is proposed that the extended courses for rural and urban specialists' certificates be different in character and conducted in different schools with special staffs and equipment.

## DENIES THAT LABOR SECRETARY WANTED TO BAR CANADIANS

TORONTO, May 3.—Denial of a statement attributed recently to Frank Morrison, secretary of the American Federation of Labor at Washington, to the effect that Canadians were included in a request made upon the United States Government to bar cheap Mexican labor from the States, was made here tonight by John Flett, general organizer of the American Federation of Labor for Eastern Canada. Mr. Flett said he was making the denial at the request of President Sam Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, on behalf of Secretary Morrison.

According to these officials, Mr. Morrison did not refer to Canadians when he was pleading to get rid of the Mexicans who have been flooding the border states with cheap labor.

## FOSTER CUNNING

OTTAWA, May 3.—(Canadian Press.)—Production of all correspondence concerning the resignation of Judge H. A. Robson from chairmanship of the board of commerce was promised by Sir George Foster today, when a motion to this effect was introduced by Dr. P. Molloy, P. A. M. It must be understood, however, said the acting prime minister, that any correspondence not in the public interest would be withheld from the file tabled in the House.

## PEACE COUNCIL SAYS WAR TO BLAME FOR ALL PRICE ADVANCES

Declaration Approved by Council Says All Wars Cause It.

OTTAWA, May 3.—(By Canadian Press.)—The disorganization of the whole economic position of Europe due to the war is the cause of the rise of prices, which is at present the source of universal discontent among the peoples, belligerents and neutrals alike, says a declaration on the economic conditions of the world, approved by the supreme council on March 8, and tabled in the House of Commons this afternoon by Sir George Foster.

"High prices" are the inevitable result of war," the declaration states, "and in comparison with most war the present situation is far from normal. In the Napoleonic wars prices in England rose 75 per cent and took eight years to become normal again. In the American Civil War American prices rose 100 per cent and took twelve years or more to become normal."

"As a result of this war, the most gigantic of all in the history of the world, general wholesale prices (as distinct from the cost of living) have advanced since 1913, approximately as follows:—

"The United States, 120 per cent; Great Britain, 170 per cent; France, Italy and Belgium, 300 per cent."

## CANADIAN DELEGATES TO CONVENTION OF FARMERS ARE NAMED

Burnaby, Lambert and Chipman Go To Chicago.

TORONTO, May 3.—The Canadian delegation to the Farmers' International Conference in Chicago on May 11 will be composed of the following: R. W. Burnaby, president of the Canadian Council of Agriculture; Norman Lambert, secretary of the Canadian Council of Agriculture; George F. Chipman, editor of the Grain Grower's Guide, Winnipeg, and a director of the Canadian Council of Agriculture.

## AUSTRALIAN IRISH HOSTILE TO VISIT OF PRINCE OF WALES

LONDON, May 3.—The industrial extremists of New South Wales mediating a general strike during the visit of the Prince of Wales, believing their demands under such circumstances will be irrevocable, according to a Sydney dispatch to the London Times today.

## CHIEF OF POLICE IS DEFENDANT IN SUIT

WINDSOR, May 3.—Chief of Police Elias Willis of Windsor is named as defendant in a suit instituted by Bernard Furlong, a local barrister, to recover \$176, which he claims the chief is illegally withholding from a client of Lawler, Richard & Sons.

## GALT COUNCIL VOTES FOR DAYLIGHT SAVING

GALT, May 3.—Daylight saving was the big item of business before the council tonight. As a result of the activity of the G. A. A., which felt that daylight saving was necessary to carry out its sport program, petitions were circulated in all the factories and foundries, and these presented tonight showed a vast majority of the citizens in favor of daylight saving. The straw vote standing 2,074 to 95. In support of the petitions there was a large delegation from the G. A. A., headed by W. W. Wilkinson, Col. A. J. Oliver and D. Hastings. In view of this strong feeling the council by a unanimous vote decided that Galt would again have daylight saving time, effective May 23 to September 5.

RIOTS ON MOSCOW. (By the Associated Press.)—Public riots and uprisings among the soldiers are reported to have occurred in Moscow upon receipt of news of the Polish successes. The reports say there are increasing demands of a change of government.

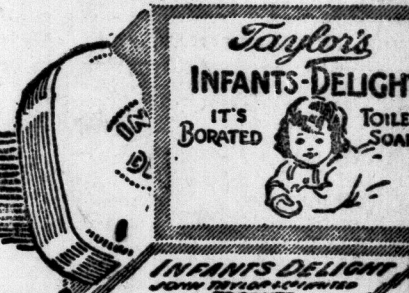

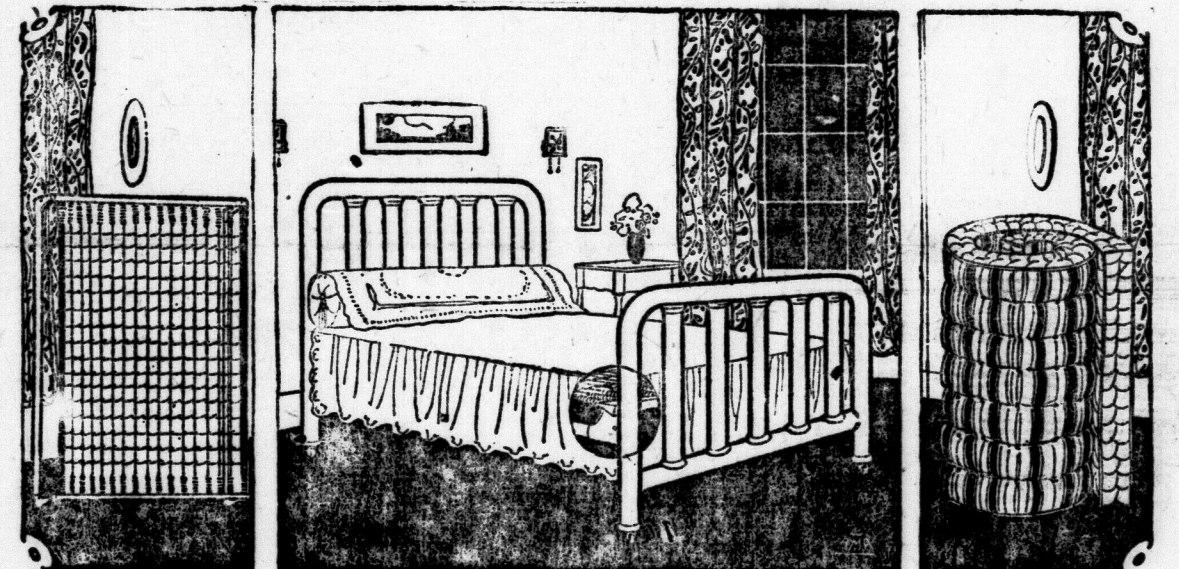

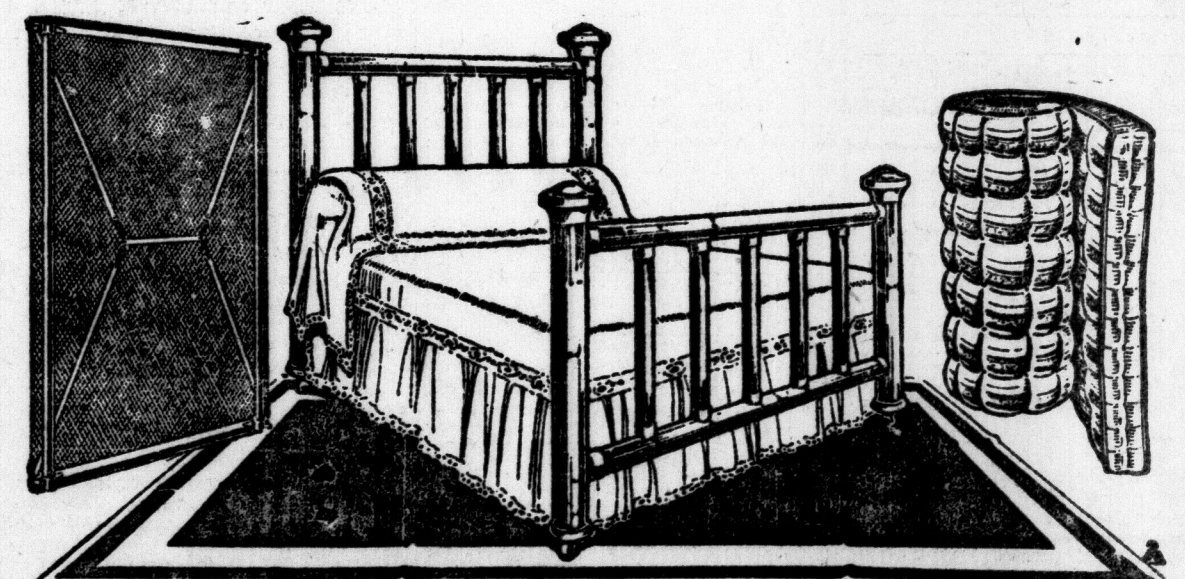
