Mr. Flett said he was making the denial at the request of President Sam Gompers of the American Federation of Labor, on behalf of Secretary Morrison.

According to these officials, Mr. Morrison did not refer to Canadians when he was pleading to get rid of the Mexicans who have been flooding the border states with cheap labor.




