### Of Interest to Women

#### SUFFRAGETTES MAKE PROTEST

Visit Cabinet Ministers' Homes and Orate from Door-steps.

LONDON, Jan. 30.—Having failed to reach King Edward yesterday during the ceremonies of the opening of parliament, and as the house of commons is effectively barred against them, the women suffragettes of England to-day adopted a new method of protesting against the fact that His Majesty, in his speech from the throne, made no mention of their demands to be permitted to vote.

The militant members of the organization formed themselves into several committees, which, at the same time, today visited the homes of the various members of the cabinet for the purpose of asking them to use their influence to have the question of the women's suffrage settled at this session. As none of the ministers would see them, the women demonstrated by ringing door bells and delivering addresses from door steps.

The police were unprepared for this course of action, and noisy scenes were witnessed on several of the fashionable thoroughfares of London. The women eventually were dispersed after seven arrests had been made.

#### World Fatten Department

It is not generally known that the most valuable collection of photographs views of New York City ever gathered was destroyed in the burning of the Parker building. Most of the pictures besides having thousands of views of other cities, had photographs and drawings of practically every important building erected in New York City in the last half century, and panoramas of the development of the city from the days of the little Dutch outposts of New Amsterdam to the forty-eight-story giants now being completed.

### ESTIMATES PREPARED FOR GIRLS CHANGE AS MEANS TO REFORM

#### Salary Increases Recommended—Old Fort and Car Lines Again Discussed.

A trio of staunch defenders of the Old Fort, E. B. Biggar, Col. G. S. Ryerson and Major Collins, appeared before the civic parks and exhibition committee yesterday to protest against the city engineer's plan for a car line thru Garrison Common. They had not, however, prepared plans for an alternative route, as requested some weeks ago. In lieu thereof Mr. Biggar submitted a memorial, drawn up by the historical societies, but, outside of Ald. Foster, the committee seemed swayed little by the sentiment.

Mayor Oliver and Mr. Biggar became involved in a heated debate, on the subject of the proposed car line, Mr. Biggar asserting that the city was only bound by agreement to preserve the Old Fort "as far as possible."

"Were there any electric cars in 1827?" Mr. Biggar wanted to know. "Can you deny that you did ride on the cars?" retorted the mayor. "And yet you will put a new electric railway thru it?" "I don't know," replied Mr. Biggar. "I don't know how many of you have seen the Old Fort," retorted Mayor Oliver. "No one answered. The committee decided to visit the common."
