CITY'S SEPTIC TANKS INFRINGE A PATENT

Legal Firm Says Claim Will Be Made—A Discovery in the Kinrade Case—Notes.

HAMILTON, April 2.—(Special).—A legal firm made a claim to the city committee this evening that the city installing septic tanks for the annex disposal works had infringed on a patent. They asked the city to send the measurement of the tanks so that they could tell how much to charge. The matter was referred to the city solicitor. The fee that will be charged residents of Hamilton for connecting with city sewers was fixed at \$7.

UNREST IN INDIA NEED CAUSE NO ALARM

Sir Andrew Fraser Heard in an Eloquent Address on the Real Conditions Existing There.

Sir Andrew Fraser, K.C.S.I., is by a good deal the biggest man that the missionary congress has brought to Toronto.

India is a country with the capacity for developing greatness and this great Scot has many of the qualities that have ranked Nicholson and Lawrence and other missionaries as great builders among the giants of their generation.

Sir Andrew at the luncheon given by the Presbyterian laymen yesterday made the story of his life an illustration of the relations that existed between the Indian people and the British Government, and those who heard it must have felt encouraged and comforted by the view he expressed and the experience on which they were founded.

Another great friend of Sir Andrew's was Sir Biplin Krishna Bose. He had gone to a club once where Sir Biplin was reading an essay on the "Theory of Conscience," full of Miller's Utilitarianism.

Sir Andrew had just come from Edinburgh, where this was not believed in. He had been educated at considerable length. They insisted on an adjournment till another evening when they had a good fight, and he went for Sir Biplin's strong, They became great bosom friends, and Sir Biplin did not believe in utilitarianism after the second meeting of the congress.

Sir Andrew took the opportunity to declare he was a sympathizer with some people in England who were presented in Meredith's "Townshend's" book. He read an extract from this which stated that an impassable wall existed between the European and the native, such as the fence of the dog and the cat, and the acquiescent cat.

It was a serious thing to combat this passage as people of Thackeray, but he gave it the experience of 37 years he contradicted, and strongest of contradictions.

Townshend had lived in Calcutta, and those who dwell there were absolutely incompetent to speak of India. Calcutta was a city of foreigners and not of Indians, and was quite out of touch with India. They must get beyond Calcutta if they expect to learn anything about India. The barrier of relation was not that between dog and cat, but that between two men. Sir Andrew spoke of the effects of sectionalism.

Sir Andrew then related a touching incident of twenty years ago when one of his Indian friends called him to go to the country to see him die. He was then secretary to the chief commissioner and he went to him and asked if he might bear the news that his second son had been just appointed to the statutory service.

"I am not to lie here any more. I am on my way to earth," he told him, for the orthodox Hindu likes to die on the bare earth. He was deeply moved when he told him about his appointment. The eldest son was to succeed his father.

"I feel very strongly about men who talk of an impassable wall between Orientals and Europeans. They know nothing about the subject," Sir Andrew asserted as a conclusion.
