Sails, and a Copper Pot, and the *Indians* having there fo much Iron that they would Trade with them for no Iron, but Sword-Blades, it feems evident that one Ship was loft, or furpriz'd by the Natives; and is also a strong Presumption that they expected to find the Passage by this Inlet.

These Islands near Whale-cove, are what Captain Fox upon his Voyage called Brigg's Mathematicks, a Number of low Islands which he saw in sailing Southerly, from Brook Cobbam or Marble Island, where he says he found the Tide had lest him, and began to follow him down the Bay, here he was satisfied he lost the Passage, but was obliged to follow his Instructions, which was to search down all the West Side of the Bay.

There is but an imperfect Account given of the Coast, from Pistol Bay to Marble Island. Scroggs only faw one Headland North West of him, which he called Cape Fair Way; fo that it appears to be broken Land or Openings and Islands betwixt that Bay and the Island, which is about seven Leagues long, from East to West, on the South Side there is a fine Cove, a small Island lying before it, which breaks off all Winds from its Entrance; it is three Fathom deep at the Entrance, and fifteen to twenty Fathom within, being land-lock'd from all Winds: the Tide of Flood came here from the Westward, and a West Moon made high Water. Scroggs called a Hill upon this Island Pits Mount, and the East Point Whalebone Bluff. There are many Deer upon this Island, it is about three Leagues from
