

SUBSCRIBED TO THE CAVELL MONUMENT

Board of Control Yesterday
Granted Five Hundred
Dollars.

ON DAYLIGHT SAVING

Will Obtain Opinions From
Public Organizations on
Scheme.

The board of control decided yesterday morning to subscribe \$500 for the monument to Nurse Edith Cavell, to be erected on University Avenue. Mayor Church told the deputation, which was introduced by Dr. Norman Allen, that as would have favored a grant of \$1000. Dr. Allen explained that they hoped to raise \$12,000 through the province. Permission will be sought from the minister of education to raise a one-cent subscription from the Ontario school children.

On the mayor's motion the board decided to obtain from various public organizations expressions of opinion on daylight saving. When this information is received the board will report the results to the city council. The Riverside Business Men's Association and the North Riverdale Ratepayers' Association sent a joint deputation asking that work on the proposed new east end car line be proceeded with immediately. The proposed line involves the laying of about a half mile of tracks. It will run from the foot of Bay street, along Richmond, Victoria, Wilton, Broadview, Gerrard and up Carlaw Avenue to North Riverdale. The board promised to give the matter their consideration.

Frank Arnold, E.C., and George Wilkin, E.C., wanted the board to proceed immediately with the expropriation of property on North and St. Joseph streets for the widening of Gerrard street. Mayor Church agreed that it was not fair to property owners to hold up the work, but the matter was held over for the consideration of a full board.

"If something is not done to improve transportation in North Toronto people will all move away," declared George Hodgson of the North Toronto Ratepayers' Association. He led a deputation who demanded that a car track be laid on Mount Pleasant Avenue without delay. Mayor Church informed them that the project was held up awaiting the decision of the city council on the Metropolitan tangle. But the city must keep faith with the people," Capt. Thorne, one of the deputation, said. "The people voted for the line and they want it."

Mayor Church said he cannot keep faith under the circumstances with all that past councils have promised. I am in favor of the double tracking of Yonge street from the C.P.R. tracks to the city limits and I would give the Metropolitan running rights.

Mr. Hodgson handed the board a petition signed by 1000 residents of North Toronto in favor of the Mount Pleasant line.

TORONTO CADETS MADE FINE SHOW

Great Satisfaction Expressed
by General Hughes and
Military Authorities.

BIG CONTRIBUTIONS

Twelve Thousand Dollars
Worth of Comforts Col-
lected From City's Pupils

One of the potent influences in making Toronto a strong recruiting centre was illustrated in the review of 3948 cadets from the city high and public schools.

As line after line of the little red-coated or khaki uniformed cadets marched past the reviewing stand, opposite McCaul school on University Avenue, Controller Thompson remarked: "No wonder Toronto can produce such fine soldiers! This is the training that counts. Why those boys," pointing out one company as it passed, "do better than many of the battalions did this morning." Mayor Church said that the cadets were the backbone of the militia.

Those at the reviewing stand certainly saw a wonderful sight, as school companies after school company received the command, "Eyes right," and with lines straight and heads erect, they passed in review before Sir Sam Hughes.

Kiddies Were Everywhere. Passing down thru Queen's Park yesterday afternoon around 2 o'clock thousands of kiddies were to be seen reveling in the grass and perched on every monument base and every other object that offered a seat. The roads to the west of the park, Queen's Avenue north of College street, the Crescent, Hoskin Avenue, Avenue road and along west on Bloor street, were lined with motor cars of all descriptions, all gaily decorated with flags and bunting and loaded with soldiers' comforts and school girls.

At the reviewing point on University Avenue a marquee had been erected, and here the school trustees, inspectors and reviewing staff had gathered, including Sir Sam Hughes, General and Mrs. Logie, Col. and Mrs. Bickford, Sir John and Lady Eaton, Bishop Sweeney,

Col. Clarke of Ottawa, Mayor Church and Controller Thompson. When Sir Sam Hughes arrived the cadets had been lined up on the east side of the avenue, and all was in readiness for the inspection of the corps and parade of cars with soldiers' comforts. Gen. Logie arrived early. The minister of militia, accompanied by Chairman Houston of the board of education, General Logie, Hon. Col. Sir John Eaton, Lieut.-Col. John Thompson and Col. Clarke, made a tour of inspection of the long line of cadets in a motor.

The "Comforts" Parade. On returning, the automobile parade of contributions of soldiers' comforts filed past, bearing innumerable articles that will make life a little more comfortable for those at the front. A girl from each school had a card with a list of articles the school contributed and the approximate value of the contribution. In the excitement of the occasion, fifteen of these little girls neglected to hand this card to the minister of militia, and the list does not contain all the schools.

It was estimated that \$12,000 worth of comforts had been contributed by the city schools. This contribution took the place of the usual empire day decoration of soldiers' monuments in Queen's Park.

Dufferin: 200 pairs of socks, \$250; 191 knitted caps, \$57.30; 150 cakes of soap, \$7.50; sundries, 150 articles, \$12. Total number of articles, 771; value, \$426.80. Clinton Street: 118 pairs of socks, \$140.25; 44 towels, \$3.50; 118 cakes of soap, \$11.50; sundries, \$55.55; number of articles 1024; value, \$316.70. Howard School: 28 pairs of socks, \$50.85; 140 towels, \$40.55; 504 tablets of soap, \$38.80; sundries, \$164.55; cash, \$15.34; articles, 264; value, \$312. The Amounts Contributed. REAL IRISH BAGPIPES FOR IRISH BATTALION

Presentation Made by Mrs. Ambrose Small on Behalf of Ladies' Auxiliary.

Toronto's Irish Battalion, the 268th, were yesterday presented with a set of real Irish bagpipes by Mrs. Ambrose Small on behalf of the ladies' committee of the Irish Regiment. The presentation was made on the city hall steps at noon in the presence of thousands of cheering spectators, and Lieut. Col. Lennox received the magnificent gift on behalf of the popular battalion.

In making the presentation, Mrs. Small referred to the glory which had been brought to the British empire by the Irish people, "I trust that the pipes will prove an inspiration and a stimulus to recruiting while the battalion is training in Toronto, and after that they may prove an inspiration to the whole of Europe when the battalion marches thru the streets of Berlin," she said. Before Lieut.-Col. Lennox replied, selections were rendered on the pipes by Piper O'Regan.

Dr. Norman Allen, who presided, referred to the great work which has been done during the war by women all over the empire, and Capt. D'Arcy Hinds also made some fitting remarks.

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
