



### PARIS EATS HORSE FLESH BY THE TON

Record for Last Year Was 22.500,000 Pounds, and Taste is Growing.

PARIS, Feb. 28—Are you fond of horseflesh? This is a question which will be
asked in Paris shortly if the increasing
popularity of horseflesh as an article of
food continues. Statistics show that of 28,973 horses sold at the Paris market last
year in the Boulevard de l'Hopital, 22,792 were sent direct to the slaughter house
to be prepared for human food.

The average weight of edible flesh from a
horse being about five hundred pounds,
it is estimated that 22,500,000 pounds of
horseflesh were eaten in Paris during 1906.
In 1899 the amount was 10,000,000 pounds.
It is stated that horseflesh is more nourishing than either beef or mutton, and
much cheaper. Some doctors recommend
the flesh of the horse to patients who are
