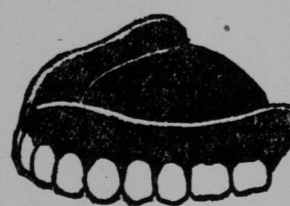

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

THE DOYLE TRAGEDY

St. John, N. B., March 30. To the Editor of The Times: Sir:—In your issue of March 30, "Reader" asks for information regarding the so-called Doyle Tragedy in St. John. Without any memo or notes of the affair this is my version of it from memory, and subject to correction if any person has the full particulars.

That they came from one of the near United States but I forget which one. The month was October—about the middle of October I think—and the year was 1872. Of course I don't remember the name of the man who was shot, but I think I remember this correctly.

An inquiry relative to the Doyle tragedy was made of Clarence Ward, mayor's clerk who remembered the affair very well. He said his wife, who was a young lady, had been in the city at the time of the tragedy. It was on a Sunday afternoon about 3.30 or 4 o'clock and Doyle and his wife were crossing Queen street, going toward the north-west corner, when Doyle stepped back and pulling a revolver from his pocket shot his wife just back of the head.

ST. JOHN. St. John, March 30. Editor Times: Sir:—In tonight's Times there is a request for the correct date of a very odd occurrence which took place in St. John. A foot note says the police records have no mention of it. The records were burned, I suppose, in 1877. I very distinctly remember the newspaper reports of the tragedy, which took place on a Sunday afternoon about 2 o'clock, in front of the Germain Street Baptist church. At that hour the street was empty. One young lady saw the shooting, gave the alarm and fainted. I have forgotten the name of the hotel the pair had lodged at but it was one of the best. They passed as a husband and wife, I think it was said.

THE CHEESE STEALING CASE

The case against the young man charged with stealing cheese from the C. P. R. St. John west, was resumed in the police court this morning. Fred R. Taylor prosecuted and E. S. Ritchie defended. Judge Ritchie reserved judgment. James Giffland, terminal agent of the C. P. R. west St. John, said that he saw the man on Thursday morning last and the prisoner told him that he had not had him arrested for stealing the cheese he would pay for it out of his salary and it would be a warning to him. In answer to E. S. Ritchie the witness said that there were two cans of cheese missing from the car and at first the prisoner said that the cheese had been given to him. That closed the case for the prosecution and the defendant was called. He said that he had been employed of the C. P. R. two months. A man standing by a car asked him if he wanted a jar of cheese. He replied in the affirmative and took the cheese and put it in the can. The defendant said that he could recognize the man who had the cheese.

INFANT'S NARROW ESCAPE

IN LAST EVENING'S FIRE

About 8.30 o'clock last night fire broke out in the house at the corner of St. Paul and Winter streets and was extinguished within half an hour. The house is occupied by Mrs. P. Kane, who conducts a grocery store and also resides in the lower part. The upper flat on one side is occupied by George A. Whelpley and on the other by Olive T. Emery. While Mrs. Emery was seeing Mrs. Kane's daughter home, she left her own children alone, and while she was absent one of the three upset a lamp. On returning the room was in flames. The children, with the exception of a sleeping infant, escaped as soon as the lamp was overturned and had not the mother acted promptly the infant would have perished. Box 231 was rung in and the department responded quickly.

Mr. Emery's furniture is damaged to the extent of \$300 and about the same amount would cover the damage done to the building, which is owned by Mrs. Kane. The latter has \$1,000 insurance with the Royal.

TURNED BACK AT THE LINE

The Eastport correspondent of the Bangor Commercial of March 30 says:—Three young men, Edward Fraser, Eddie Longworth and Frederick Murray, who came from St. John on the steamer Calvin Austin last Wednesday, were deported by the immigration inspectors on Saturday. The young men concealed themselves on the steamer as she was leaving St. John for Eastport and as soon as they were detected they were placed under arrest by Captain Pike, who turned them over to the immigration inspectors when the Austin returned here. The boys were taken to the police station where they were allowed the freedom of the guard room during their stay in the city. They were bright looking fellows, apparently not over 20 years of age, and they were somewhat disappointed at not being permitted to remain in this country.
