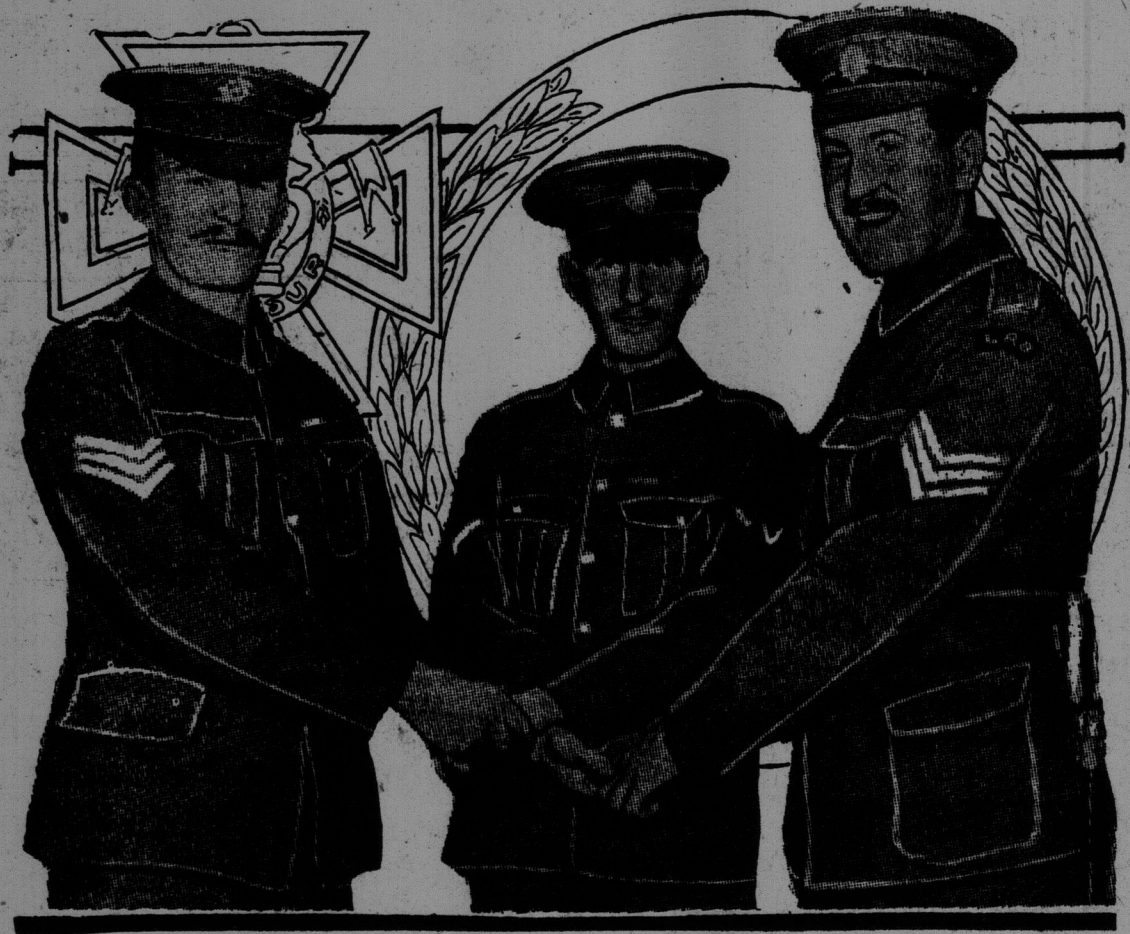


A TRIO OF HEROES
