Some Values Showed Slightly Downward Tendencies

**UNITED STATES STEEL DOWN IN NEW YORK**

Wall Street Prices Drifted Irregularly Lower at Opening Today

MONTREAL, June 8.—There was a fair volume of trading on the local stock exchange during the first half hour this morning, with values revealing a firm to slightly downward tendency. Montreal Power was by far the most active stock. This issue opened unchanged at 22 1/2, but in subsequent trading touched 22 1/4. Brazilian and Smelters were moderately active, the former selling around 58 1/2, while Smelters were very soft, opening at 21 1/4 for a loss of a half and in subsequent trading touched 21 1/2, for a net loss of 3 1/2 points. Other features included Asbestos preferred unchanged at 7 1/2. Steamships preferred off a half at 7 1/2. Asbestos (I & C) unchanged at 25. NEW YORK, June 8.—Stock prices drifted irregularly lower at the opening of today's market, which was forced to absorb additional realising sales. United States Steel was the most active feature, yesterday's sharp gain and selling pressure also was directed against General Motors, American Can, Montgomery Ward, Atlantic Refining and U. S. Rubber.

Morning Stock Letter

NEW YORK, June 8.—With the exception of U. S. Steel, the stock market yesterday was not very strong. There was considerable selling of pool stocks like Int. Com. Eng. and the motors were weak in anticipation of the cut in prices. The latter may cause more liquidation in motors today, but on any day we would buy G.M. We have consistently held that steel would make a new high this year, and its recent action confirms our belief. Think that those who have the best speculation among the independentists and that eventually it will sell several hundred dollars a share. Yesterday's selling in Comb. Engine seemed to be one of its periodic reactions, and while again we must point out the extreme danger to the stock, we believe it can be bought on the extreme danger to the stock. We think the recent move in steel will serve as a powerful advertisement for the stock market and that public interest will increase. We think the trend of the market is still distinctly upward.

NEW YORK, June 8.—Mary Biller, 15 years old, was awakened before dawn recently in her room on the fourth floor of 3483 Third Avenue, the Bronx, by a stinging pain in her cheek. As she opened her eyes she saw a man clambering over the window sill to the fire escape.

Waiting until he had vanished she called her elder sister, who sleeps in the same room, and she turned on a light. At the sight of Mary's face, which had been laid open with a knife, her sister screamed. Their mother, Mrs. Jennie Biller, and their brother, William, 14 years old, ran in.

Neighbors blew police whistles and two taxicab drivers seized Eugene Gustave, of the Bronx, near the house and held him until a policeman arrived, who locked him up on suspicion. In Morristown police court he was held for further examination when he failed to give a satisfactory explanation of his presence in the neighborhood.

C. N. R. Chief Talks To Kiwanis Delegates

MONTREAL, June 8.—The 7,000 delegates to the Kiwanis tenth annual international convention attended the president's reception and ball at Montreal's four largest hotels last night. Earlier in the evening the members had attended twenty-eight district dinners held simultaneously in twenty-eight different city dining rooms. Yesterday the delegates were addressed by Sir Henry Thornton, president of the Canadian National Railways, Canada's rise to a place among the nations of the world, was the main theme of Sir Henry's address.
