## DATES FOR MEET APPROVED BY SKATING UNION

**D. J. Corr Elected Vice-President at Opening Session**

**APPROVAL** by the International Skating Union of January 19, 20 and 21 as the dates for holding the world championship speed-skating meet here was reached at the annual session yesterday in Pittsburgh, and the final obstacle in Saint John's way to staging the greatest speed-skating meet in history has been cleared. Coupled with this news from Pittsburgh is the decision of the union to elect D. J. Corr, secretary of the Saint John Skating Association, to a vice-presidency of the union. This puts Mr. Corr in line for the presidency in course of time.

W. J. Bratton, Pittsburgh, was re-elected president, while other officers named include Henry North, New York, and W. W. Ossum, Detroit, as vice-presidents, and B. H. Giffen, Pittsburgh, secretary-treasurer. The awards for the national, indoor and outdoor events for the season will be made at today's meeting. Pittsburgh wants the indoor meet, while Detroit is angling for the outdoor events. It is probable that an indoor meet also will be sanctioned for the new Madison Square Garden, New York.

Within a few weeks' time Clair Thurnburg, Olympic champion, will be leaving his native shores for his long jaunt to the side of the water in defence of the world's crown, final arrangements for his visit having been completed on Friday in Montreal with the Finnish consul-general. Now that the American Association has been put on the plans of the local association, speed skaters all over the United States and Canada will point themselves for the big meet here, which will be the high spot in the game this year. Local skaters, headed by Charles Gorman, are out training daily now for the coming season. The reputation of the Saint John's reputation in the skating world.

## KASKEY RE-INSTATED.

**PITTSBURGH, Nov. 23.**—Tonight the Union was re-instated. Harry Kaskey, of Chicago, of the Western Skating Association. He was suspended in 1923 for an excessive expensive account at LaPlacid. **FREDERICTON, Nov. 23.**—During the week-end further negotiations for a playoff for the Maritime rugby title between the Wanderers A. A. of Halifax and the University of New Brunswick were carried on although U. N.
