WOMEN'S INSTITUTE ANNUAL MEETING

Election of Officers Results in Mrs. T. N. Vincent Being Re-elected President.

At the annual meeting of the Women's Institute held yesterday afternoon in the Health Centre, Mrs. T. N. Vincent was re-elected president. A hearty welcome was extended to Mrs. Richard Hooper who has just returned from England.

The officers elected were as follows: President, Mrs. T. N. Vincent; first vice-president, Mrs. Frank Rowe; second vice-president, Mrs. J. D. Seely; secretary, Mrs. Andrew J. Mulcahy; treasurer, Mrs. Richard J. Hooper; additional members of the executive, Miss H. T. Melkiohn, Mrs. J. H. Doody, Mrs. Kenneth Haley, Miss Josephine Darrick, Mrs. Arthur W. Adams and Mrs. J. M. Taylor.

The delegates appointed to attend the provincial convention in Fredericton were as follows: Mrs. W. V. Lawlor, Mrs. E. A. Wilson, Mrs. J. D. Seely, Mrs. J. M. Taylor and Miss Darrick. The provincial convention will be held on Tuesday of next week and the federal convention from Wednesday to Saturday, in Fredericton. Many delegates from all parts of the Dominion will attend the provincial convention and will go on from Fredericton to Halifax for the annual meeting of the National Council of Women. Mrs. Vincent, Mrs. Hooper and Mrs. Lawlor will attend the federal convention, at which Mrs. Hooper will read a paper.

The annual report of the secretary, Mrs. Mulcahy, reviewed the varied activities of the year. Taking charge of the tea room at the exhibition had been the outstanding effort and it was decided to assume this task this year also. The institute gave \$500 which financed the special training of Miss Armstrong, who has now entered on her duties as public health nurse at Plaster Rock. Besides contributing \$50 to the Health Centre, the institute had paid for the care of a boy convalescing from tuberculosis and gave donations to the following causes: Old Ladies' Home, Mater Misericordiae Home, Children's Aid, Good Shepherd Home, Protestant Orphanage and Empty Stocking Fund. The financial report showed that there was a balance of more than \$200.

Mrs. Hooper in her account of the institutes in Great Britain, said that they now numbered 2,900.

The grading of eggs was much discussed at the meeting, the plan being unanimously approved and attention being drawn to a statement that fifteen cartons of eggs, containing 4,000 cases of thirty dozen cold storage eggs from Boston, had been sold in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia for from sixty to seventy-five cents a dozen, as strictly fresh. The advances in the price of sugar and of bread were also spoken of and these advances were viewed with some indignation.

Crop Reports From West Encouraging
(Canadian Press.)

Winnipeg, June 6.—With growth generally satisfactory and favorable weather conditions during the past week, the crop throughout the three prairie provinces is making good headway, according to the weekly crop report issued by the Agricultural Department of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

There is very little cutworm damage, but grasshoppers are prevalent in certain districts. The damage is not yet extensive.

Manitoba has experienced excellent crop weather and seeding is almost completed. The recent precipitation and present heat have brought the crops along quickly. Pastures are in good condition. Manitoba crops are not suffering from grasshoppers.

DIES ON EVE OF WEDDING.
Camden (N.J.) Woman Had Been Engaged for Ten Years.

Camden, N. J., June 6.—On the eve of her wedding, Miss Clara Deacon, 53 years old, died here. The Rev. Rudolph Brestell, who went to St. Paul's M. E. Church to perform the marriage ceremony of Miss Deacon to John Schwartz of Andahon, will officiate at her funeral instead.

Miss Deacon died in Cooper Hospital after a week's illness. She was taken sick while preparing for her nuptials. Instead of accompanying his bride on a honeymoon trip to Washington, as had been planned, Schwartz will be the chief mourner at the funeral.

Edmund Deacon, a brother said: "Clara and John have been engaged for ten years, but the wedding was put off so that my sister could remain with mother, who was growing old and feeble. When mother died last November in her ninety-fifth year, the wedding date was set for this June. She was very happy preparing for her marriage when she was stricken."

GERMANS ASKED TO PAY FOR AFRICAN WAR RAID

Portuguese Presents Belated Claim for Stations Burned and Rebuilt by Enemy.

Berlin, June 6.—A belated claim for reparations put in appearance at the Foreign Office the other day. The claimant is the accredited representative of the Portuguese colony of Mozambique. After displaying a letter of introduction from the German Minister at Lisbon, he proceeded in a semi-apologetic manner to explain the character of his mission.

The explanation terminated with the presentation of a bill for damages done by Colonel von Lettow-Vorbeck, commander of the German troops in German East Africa, who gained notoriety as a raider when he crossed the frontier into Portuguese territory in 1916.
