

BISHOP LEBLANC TO CONDUCT SERVICES

Dedication of Memorial Chapel at Grand Pre on Wednesday—Many Prominent Men Expected.

(Halifax Chronicle.)

Acadians from all parts of Canada and from the United States will assemble at Grand Pre, N. S., on Wednesday next, to consecrate the chapel which is being erected at that historic spot as a shrine to the memory of the Acadians. The chapel is supposed to be an exact reproduction of the old chapel which witnessed the tragic events of the expulsion. Its dedication will be an occasion of national interest, and is the outcome of the great Acadian Congress which was held at Church Point and Grand Pre last year. It will be in many respects a sequel to that inspiring event. The dedicatory service, or mass will be held between ten and eleven o'clock on Wednesday morning. The afternoon will be given over to public meetings and inspection of the chapel, the exterior of which is now almost completed. Special trains will be run from Moncton and Yarmouth. The train from Moncton will leave there eight p. m. Tuesday August 15, arriving at Truro at 1.30 a. m. Wednesday 16th, leaving there via the Midland at 5 a. m. arriving at Grand Pre at 7 a. m. The special from Yarmouth will leave there at 5 a. m. Wednesday and proceeding direct to Grand Pre, stopping at all the principal points. Acadians and their friends from that section of Nova Scotia. There is also a large number of visitors expected from Halifax, who will travel out on the regular trains.

Bishop LeBlanc Will be Present.

His Lordship Rev. E. A. LeBlanc, Bishop of St. John, N. B., the first Acadian Bishop in the Maritime Provinces, will conduct the services of the mass. The special sermon will be preached by some noted preacher, the name of whom is not yet known. Rev. A. D. Cormier, the prime mover of the chapel, will deliver the dedicatory address. The hour set for the morning service was ten o'clock, but if the train from Yarmouth should be late in arriving the service in all probability will be delayed until arrival of the Yarmouth contingent of visitors. Judge Rivard, of Quebec, will be the speaker of the afternoon service. The special representative from Montreal, and there will be in all probability a representative of the Government of Nova Scotia present. The chapel is a replica of the original Acadian Chapel as far as it has been able to ascertain any idea of the architecture of that building, and has been built of native stone from the Wallace quarries. It was proposed that the site would be at the corner of the old French road leading from the railway to the well, in line with the stone cross and to the south. The size is approximately 40 by 80 feet, with a vestry of 12 feet by 15 feet. The building has been of such selected stone as to have the appearance of being a weather worn as possible, and the design is Norman.

Will Spend \$50,000.

While the exterior is to be as plain as possible it is the intention of the committee in charge to have an elaborate and expensive interior as the architect can design. White or tinted marble is to be used with mosaic floor. The memorial chapel will be dedicated not for ordinary church purposes, but as a memorial to commemorate the event of 1755, and it is the intention to gather as many relics as possible of Acadian history. To this end Mr. Herbin has offered his entire collection. A gentleman in New Brunswick has also a collection of 87 different articles of considerable historic value which he will donate.


The vestry of the building is to be used for the displaying of resources of the Annapolis Valley and will be handed over to the Dominion Atlantic Railway for that purpose.

ALLEGED DRUG RING BETRAYED BY GIRL

Young Addict from Chicago Leads Detectives to Peddlers and Four are Held.

New York, Aug. 15. — Four alleged drug peddlers were arrested by detectives on the staff of Special Deputy Police Commissioner Carleton Simon, in charge of the narcotic division, as the result of information given the commissioner by a young woman from Chicago who has become a drug addict since her arrival here several weeks ago. Federal warrants will be asked for two other persons who are said to have become millionaires from the unlawful sale of narcotics.

The young woman appeared at Bellevue Hospital for treatment for drug addiction. As required under a recent regulation, she was first sent to Commissioner Simon's office to be interviewed. She gladly consented to aid the police in rounding up the men who had sold her her drugs. Detectives Farlong and Barry were sent to the barber's shop at 899 Ninth avenue, where, pending the arrival of the girl in quest of drugs, they had some work done. The girl came in, called for the drug and then went out, followed by a barber. Other detectives outside the building put the barber, Catania, under arrest when they saw him pass a small package to the girl. He fought the detectives, and it was some time before he was subdued. Twenty-five small bottles of heroin were found in the barber's shop, the police said. A similar case was worked at the other barber's shop. Then the girl went to a place at 110th street and Broadway. The police said she could get no drug there, but was told that an agent of the man would sell her some at 131st street and Lexington avenue. There she met two men and obtained from them, the police said, four decks of heroin. The police said they then searched a shed from which the men were seen to obtain the heroin and found forty more decks of the drug.

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
