IN LIGHTER VEIN

J. D. McArthur and Associates Secure Charter From Edmonton to Fort George

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 24.—Announcement that J. D. McArthur, millionaire railway contractor, of Winnipeg, and several associates, has acquired a charter for a railway extending from Edmonton to Fort George, B. C., made by J. L. Cote, member for Athabasca in the Alberta Legislature.

The proposed line will traverse the richest portion of the Peace River district, entering British Columbia via Pine River Pass, north of Yellowhead Pass, and opening a vast region in the northern portion of this province.

It will be more than 1,000 miles long and will take the shape of two sides of a triangle, whose apex will be at Pine River Pass, which has a low altitude.

An exploratory survey party is now going over the route to secure data preliminary to undertaking the location work. It is expected that the line will be completed and in operation within four years, as it is understood arrangements for financing the proposition have already been completed.

This road, when completed, will connect with the Grand Trunk Pacific at Port George, providing a link in a through route from Vancouver to the Peace River district.

Grand Trunk Getting Thirty New Engines

Montreal, Oct. 23.—The Grand Trunk has placed orders for twenty switching engines and ten Richmond compound-consolidated engines. Ten of the switching engines are to be built by the Lima Locomotive works and the Richmond compound engines by the American Locomotive Company.

The working pressure of the switch engines is 100 lbs., and of the compound-consolidated engine 210 lbs. The tender of the switch engines will have a capacity of 4,500 gallons of water and eight tons of coal.

The compound-consolidated engine will have a capacity of 7,000 gallons of water and from ten to fifteen tons of coal. The tractive power of the switch engines is 29,983 lbs., and of the compound-consolidated 36,000 lbs.






