ESTIMATES INCLUDE MILLION FOR HARBOR

Provision of \$100,000 for Post Office Building in St. John

Maritime Province Figures in Government's List—Caucus of Do Nothing Policy in Regard to Branch Lines

Ottawa, Jan. 10.—St. John fares well in the estimates which were tabled today. There is \$1,000,000 for harbor improvements, and \$100,000 to commence a new post office.

The estimates were larger, totalling \$140,789,677, about \$10,000,000 greater than the last main estimates brought down by the late government.
