ELECTRIC POWER TO
REPLACE STEAM IN
COTTON MAKING

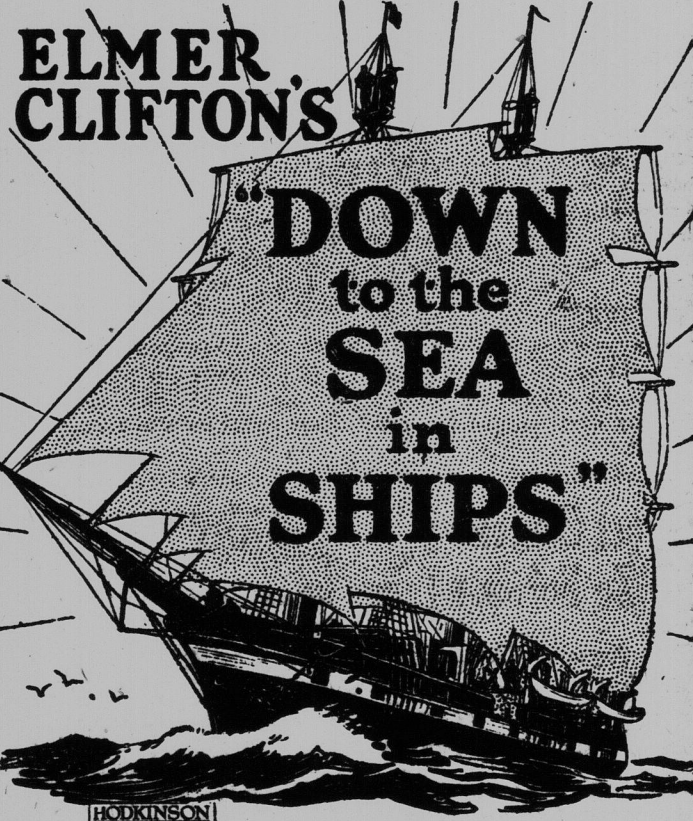
London, March 31.—(By Mail).—It is believed there is a great future for electricity in the cotton trade and that the steam plant is doomed, declared G. B. Williamson, chief engineer of the Amalgamated Cotton Mills Trust. In an interview recently with "The London Daily Mail" representative, Mr. Williamson has under his control thirty-eight separate power plants.

"The cotton trade," he said, "was built up round the power plant, and when it is possible to obtain it from the public supply, like water and gas, the inevitable tendency will be to move out of the congested towns into the country and on to the coast, in the interests of the operatives."
