

UP BOND ISSUE

Matter of Some \$750,000 R. E. Armstrong, secretary of the Board of Trade, yesterday received from the Formosan Government a sample of Formosa Oolong tea. to be Dealt With at City Hall.

> Among the matters to come up at the council meeting this afternoon will be formal notice for the issue of bonds. About three-quarters of a million will be added to the bonded debt of the city. Of this amount \$462,000 is for the hydro distribution system and for current purchased from the New Brunswick Electric Power Commission and it is expected a resolution will be introduced to make the interest and sinking fund charges on these payable by the Civic Power Commission.
