

BISHOP HORNER DIES IN HARNESS

(Canadian Press Despatch.)
Kingston, Ont., Sept. 12.—A telegram announcing the sudden death of Ivanhoe, Hastings county, where he was taking part in a camp meeting, of Bishop Horner, founder of the Holiness Movement, and the present Standard Church, was received here this afternoon. Death came at 4 o'clock this morning, the message said, and though Bishop Horner has not been in good health of late, his death was unexpected. The body will be sent to Ottawa for interment.

Bishop Ralph Cecil Horner was born in Clarendon township, Pontiac county (Que.) on Dec. 22, 1854. He became a Methodist minister, but was suspended from the Methodist church for choosing to do evangelistic rather than pastoral work in 1895.

DIVIDING ALIEN FAMILIES IN U. S. SHOCKS HUMANITY, SAYS SIEGEL

Washington, Sept. 13.—Executive intervention in the enforcement of immigration laws, so that "American traditions regarding humanity" may be upheld, was sought by Representative Siegel of New York, in a letter to President Harding.

Immigration officials at Ellis Island, Mr. Siegel said, are now separating parents from children, "the parents being submitted and their children sent back, because they happened to arrive after the quota had been filled."

"There is no reason," the New York member of the House Committee on Immigration and Naturalization said, "why members of families who arrive after the quotas of each month have been filled, should not be permitted to remain at Ellis Island, or to land under bond and be counted for the next month's quota."

UNCORSETED, IS MAN'S EQUAL

Baltimore Women Physicians See Sex Freer Since War.

Baltimore, Sept. 8.—That women who do not wear corsets are far better insurance risks than those who do, is the opinion of women doctors in Baltimore. In fact, not a woman doctor could be found who favored corsets worn at all tightly.

Not only did women physicians think that life is prolonged by women who discard corsets, but many were of the opinion that women are developing endurance and muscular activity almost equal to men's by discarding their waist armor.

Dr. Anna S. Abercrombie, who is industrial physician to a number of large enterprises employing many women in Baltimore, and who was in charge of a recent summer camp for women and girls, said that the difference in activity and endurance between women who do and those who do not wear corsets was marked.

"In choosing women employees at the concern in which I am the attending physician, we are very careful in selecting from the physical point of view. We never pass a woman who is tightly laced," said Dr. Abercrombie.

Dr. Mary Mead Dean joined with Dr. Abercrombie in her denunciation of corsets.

"While I have not made any great study as to whether women who do not wear corsets make better insurance risks, I believe that it is true," said Dr. Dean. "There is no question that corsets retard the circulation of the blood, decrease the lung capacity and cause the muscles of the abdomen to lose their tone."

"The corsets that most women wear today, however, are not much more than girdles and are infinitely superior to the old-fashioned kind."

"I do not think that women will ever go back to the tightly laced corset. Women have much more independent minds since the war and are not going to be so easily dictated to."

OPPOSE BUSINESS KNICKERS.

Baltimore Employers Fear Male Clerks' Work Would Lag.

Baltimore, Md., Sept. 13.—It's thumbs down in Baltimore on the business girl attired in knickers. Unlike the Chicago employer, who is reported as much pleased with the tailored suit in which knickerbockers are substituted for the skirt, Baltimore employers, without exception, insist that they would not employ girls wearing knickers.

Not that they think them immodest, for among the large number of employers interviewed not one failed to say

that for sports wear he thought knickers just the thing.

Baltimore employers, however, think that knickers in the office would keep all the male clerks from their work. If the offices had plate-glass windows, they opine that the crowds which would gather before them would result in a hurry call for the police reserves. In other words, the criticism is based on the attention which the knickers would attract and not on the knickers themselves.

One of the officials of a local savings bank, which has employed only women clerks since the war, while stating emphatically that he would not engage a woman clerk who applied for a position

wearing knickers, added that, in his judgment the time would come when the wearer of skirts would be the exception rather than the rule.

SOUTH AFRICA SENDS MAN WITH SHACKLETON

London, Sept. 13.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Reuter's Cape Town correspondent cables that Doctor Goodard, professor of geology and zoology at Stellenbosch University, South Africa, has been officially nominated to accompany the staff of Sir Ernest Shackleton's "Quest" expedition to Antarctica. Sir Ernest's staff now numbers eighteen and includes at least one representative from each of the self-governing dominions.
