FIRST EDITION. ICE PATHS BEFORE PEARY.
AN OLD ARCTIC VOYAGER ON THE EXPEDITION'S DANGER.

Peary that the little party now in Melville Bay will never return. "What was the Food—Plan to get out of the Bay—What will be the Result Next Year."

Washington, D. C., Sept. 8.—John K. Kenney of the Froben expedition is out in another card, in which he expresses the opinion that Lind Peary's danger is greater than has been thought.

The trouble is this: Peary being late in this time, when the ice is melting, it is probable that he will not be able to get on deck to superintend things—because of the necessity of preserving gas in the tanks to get in—no doubt, but to capture them requires harpoons and lances, and men who understand their use.

When are very numerous during this month, but not that on a boat they will sink on being shot. They leave the seal and walrus above as the ice makes in the fall of the year. The ice island, 100 miles northwest of McCormick bay, situated on the northwest point of the island, are 200 miles apart. On the southern end of the island are six tons of coal, left by Melville in 1881 from the steamer "Nep- tunc. I saw them in 1883.

Lind Peary can draw from these, if there, but will require the sleds and sledges. He would have nearly 300 miles to travel there and back over the ice on foot, as his men do not know how to drive dogs. Only one white man is twenty or more successful in managing these dogs. The country 40 miles back of Peary's present position is as little known as the moon. How a man with a weak leg expects to clamber up the cliffs of the ice and to the top of a peak of snow and ice, rising thousands of feet, like a perpendicular wall, after gaining the summit, by steering a northeast course he will be able to cut off 2,000 miles of coast line, going entirely west of Froben's point, reaching the southern edge of the Humboldt glacier 50 miles east of Peary's bay. From there after crossing the glacier 60 miles at its narrowest point, he has many hundred miles to travel to reach the ice on foot, as his men do not know how to drive dogs. Only one white man is twenty or more successful in managing these dogs. They are like big timber wolves, and just as savage. I expect he intends, falling back on the cache at Littleton Island, if short, on his way from the interior.

ALMY'S CASE.
MIS FEELERS PLOTTING FOR HIS ESCAPE.

Some Suspicious Movements on the Part of a Confederate.

Boston, Sept. 11.—A special from Manchester, N. H., says "It is the opinion of some of the state officials here that some of Almy's (or Abbott's) old time confederates are plotting to aid the prisoner to escape from the Central jail."

Herry Freble, recently arrested for forgery and who occupies a cell in the prison, is thought to be one of those most interested in the plot. Freble, although he can easily secure bail which would give him freedom, makes no attempt to do so. Since his imprisonment he has sent telegrams to men in Springfield, Montreal and Boston. The messages read, "Trouble, come at once." The theory, which is substantiated by reliable information, is that he is not so much interested in the release of Almy and his escape, but in carrying out plans for the escape of Almy and his escape.
