ALMOST A TRAGEDY.

Hundreds of Canada National Fair Vis-
itors Watch Lineman as 2,200 Volts
Pass Through His Body.

Toronto, Sept. 1.—The horrible spec-
tacle of a lineman hanging over the
arm of a pole twenty feet above the
ground, with 2,200 volts of electricity
passing through his body, and the odor
of burning flesh penetrating the nostrils,
was presented to more than a thousand
eye-witnesses at the Canada National
Exhibition on Manufacturers' Day yester-
day.

John Mitchell, a Toronto Electric
Light Co. lineman, was the victim of the
company with Lineman in the Adminis-
tration building. Mitchell's spur came
in contact with the primary wire, and
he fell over the cross-arm. Melville
realized his companion's danger, and as
quickly as possible rescued the primary
wire and cut it, but not until the vic-

Manufacturers' Day.
Thursday the third fine-weather day,
and consequently the third day of big
things at the Fair, Eighty-five thou-
sand people were on the grounds Wed-
nesday, according to the figures given
out at the Administration building.

At the directors' luncheon yesterday,
the guest of honor was Percy Hurd,
one of the secretaries of the British
Tariff Reform League. President W.
K. George of the Manufacturers' Asso-
ciation sat upon Mr. McNaught's right
and the guests were some of the largest
manufacturers in Canada. After
President George and Secretary George
R. Roach of the same association had
spoken, Mr. Hurd was heard. He said
he was here in his private capacity.
Discussing the Chamberlain proposals
as affecting the industrial life of Can-
ada, he declared that to keep back
Canada from a manufacturing status
would be like trying to keep back the
sea. Canada's position did not stand
in the way of full and sympathetic co-
operation. The preferential trade ques-
tion was one of time, and of method
and of tact. Patience and intelligence
were required for all great movements.
Mr. Hurd said that there was no in-
trigue in the Chamberlain scheme. The
whole Empire was working together
for the mutual advantage of the
whole Empire.

The manufacturers enthusiastically
applauded Mr. Hurd's statements.
Dairy Product Prices.
The awards were made in the dairy
building yesterday, and a talk on the
nutritive possibilities of cereals, interesting
in their bearing on the food of the
future, was given in the Women's Insti-
tute by Prof. Harcourt of the O. A. C.

In the dairy building, too, there open-
ed the final stage of the first but-
ter-making contest, for which the con-
ditions of entry were that the candi-
date must be either a farmer's wife, daugh-
ter or residing upon a farm in the vicin-
ity of the contest. The contestants in the
class are Miss Jayne, Grafton; Miss Car-
rick, Galt; Miss Val-
lens, Valens; and F. H. Dunn, Guelph.
Today is Press Day, under the aus-
pices of the Canadian Press Associa-
tion.

Prince Louis Departs.
A number of society people and civic
officials gathered at the Union station
last night to bid Prince Louis of Bat-
lenburg farewell. The prince's depar-
ture was marked by sincere regret.
He thanked those present for the
pains they had taken for insuring his
safety, and he was heartily
sorry to leave at a time when he was
enjoying himself so much, but duty
called.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST

HOMESTEAD REGULATIONS.

ANY even numbered section of Do-
minion Lands in Manitoba or the
Northwest Provinces, excepting 8
and 26, not reserved, may be home-
steaded by any person who is the
sole head of a family, or any male
over 18 years of age, to the extent
of one-quarter section of 160 acres
more or less.

Entry may be made personally at
the local land office for the district
in which the land is situated, or if
the homesteader desires, he may, on
application to the Minister of the In-
terior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of
Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local
agent receive authority for some one
to make entry for him.

The homesteader is required to per-
form the conditions connected
therewith under one of the following
plans:

(1) At least six months' residence
upon cultivation of the land in
each year for three years.

(2) If the father (or mother if the
father is deceased) of the homestead-
er resides upon a farm in the vicini-
ty of the land entered for the re-
quirements as to residence may be
satisfied by such person residing with
the father or mother.

(3) If the settler has his permanent
residence upon farming land owned
by him in the vicinity of his home-
stead, the requirements as to resi-
dence may be satisfied by residence
upon the said land.

Six months' notice in writ-
ing should be given to the Commis-
sioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa
of intention to apply for patent.
