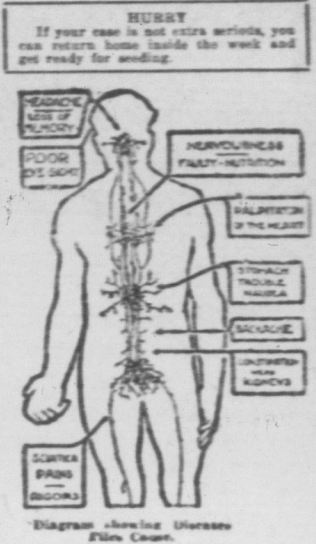

of influenza in some districts. Great enthusiasm has been shown in the project, especially in the schools, towns and villages, and the rural municipality officials are only waiting, in some cases for the next regular meeting to take up the project.

Majors Adams and Secord this evening will address the Community club at Cupar, where delegates from Markinch and Dysart will be present to get first hand information concerning the campaign in order to properly direct it in the district.

On Wednesday Sergt. Major Gibson will go to Balcarres, and in the evening address a meeting of the citizens explaining to them the work of the campaign. Balcarres is in the centre of a territory from which a large number of soldiers enlisted in the great war and reports are to the effect that the district has been practically organized by these men.

SHORTAGE OF FARM LABOR EXPECTED

Farmers in Saskatchewan will commence the seeding season with a shortage of about 2,000 laborers, according to estimates made by T. M. Molloy, provincial commissioner of labor. It is calculated that the keenest demand for farm laborers will be on or about April 15.

The situation, however, will depend to a great extent on demobilization progress in the meanwhile.

General Hoffmann Tells Why Germany Lost War

Berlin, Germany, March 16. — "You don't understand the war," said Gen. Hoffmann to me today. "Germany was not beaten on the western front. Neither Marshal Foch, nor Field Marshal Haig, nor Gen. Pershing defeated the German armies. Germany was beaten by an upstart named Lenin," so reports a United States newspaper correspondent.

The man who had signed the Brest-Litovsk treaty, who was chief of staff of Germany's eastern armies for three years, and who today is spoken of by the Germans as the brains behind Hindenburg and the real victor in the battle of Tannenberg, smiled at me through the smoke of his cigar.

"You ask me what I consider lost the war for Germany? My answer is Bolshevism. I will tell you the exact moment that marked the beginning of the end. It was when Gen. Ludendorff telephoned me at the headquarters on the eastern front from France to sign peace—any peace—with any Russian able to write his name. "The Americans are coming," said Ludendorff, "and we need every corps we have on the western front. Make peace with Russia and release our armies there at once."

through Belgium was planned years ago by Count Schieffen. He named the two generals who sent Germany into the scrap heap of nations—Von Moltke in the west and Falkenhayn in the east. It was German militarism that talked through this clear headed, keen visioned, sophisticated, unscrupulous German, whose business was war.

"You are wrong when you say that Germany played with Bolshevism. Bolshevism played with Germany. Had Germany crushed the Russian armies, as she could have done in 1915, by attacking Kovno instead of Warsaw and signed peace with the czar Germany would have dictated peace with the entente six months later. Gen. Falkenhayn's campaign against Warsaw was Germany's second great error. Germany's first great error was made by Gen. Von Moltke on the western front before the battle of the Marne. By bringing five divisions up from the left wing in Alsace to the right wing Germany should have reached Paris and the channel ports before the end of the year 1915.

First Step to Ruin

"Immediately upon signing with the Bolsheviks we discovered that we had been conquered by them instead of having conquered them. Our victorious army became rotten with Bolshevism. Our military machine became the printing press of Bolshevist propaganda. We did not dare to send a corps of the German Bolsheviks to the Western front. What was much worse, thousands of Bolsheviks entered Germany itself. It was Lenin and army Bolshevist propaganda that defeated Germany, undermined the morale and stirred up the quack Socialists in the country. I spoke to Scheidemann at the time. "If you don't stop agitation," I told him, "you'll ruin Germany." He agreed to stop agitation.

thought that Herr Scheidemann had hurt Germany by his Socialist propaganda.

"No," he replied. "Scheidemann was all right. It was Russian agents who did it and German fanatics like Liebknecht."

What Kaiser Thought

I asked Gen. Hoffmann if he thought with the Kaiser that America could not raise an army.

"No," said the general, "Gen. Ludendorff and I knew that America would send over an army. Ludendorff remained optimistic, however. As for the Kaiser he believed until August, 1918, that Germany would win the war. He still believed at that time that 60 per cent. of the Americans were opposed to entering the war, but that the United States was forced to join in the conflict because too much capital had been invested in France, England and Russia."

His Idea of Bolshevism

"What would you do now to preserve Germany?" I asked.

"Exterminate Bolshevism with an iron hand and much more energetically than Herr Noske is doing. I have seen the horrible effects of Bolshevism upon the country. I have seen even the victorious German army undermined. I have seen bourgeoisie who owned a toothbrush lined up against a wall and shot in the name of freedom of the proletariat. Here we sit with plenty to eat," added the general, pointing to the remains of the afternoon tea, "but beyond the masses are waiting for a chance."

I asked the general between whom he thought the next war would be. After a minute's silence he replied:

"If the statesmen of the entente are clever the next war will be between Russia and the new entente including France, Britain, America, Italy and Germany. After Brest-Litovsk there was only one war left—a war between the proletariat and the bourgeoisie. If the entente is not clever Bolshevism is certain to overrun Germany and enter France and in addition to not being able to collect a farthing from Germany the entente will have a new war on its hands alone—a war which the entente is doomed to lose. Russia must be crushed."

ed, otherwise Russian Bolshevism is destined to overthrow the world's society. The Paris conference is not writing world peace but the world's death warrant if it delays much longer in lifting the blockade.

Blockade Effect

I asked if the blockade also had something to do with defeating Germany. The general smiled and replied: "Just as much as the U-boat had to do with starving England."

"No, they will need me in Germany. I hope yet to fight on the side of the allies against Russia. Today the entente is laughing at the Bolshevik menace as we laughed in 1917, but—" The general sighed.

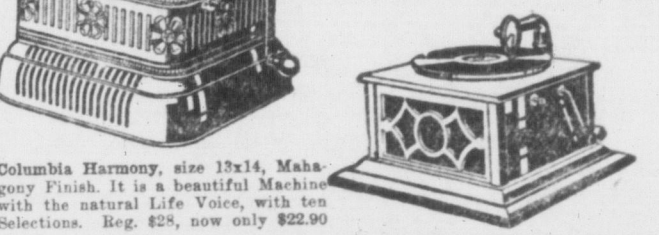
Gen. Hoffmann finished his cigar in silence and arose—a massive shouldered giant with beetling brows, red-faced and firm spoken. Extending his hand he concluded.

"In 1913 I foresaw a war and I thought I foresaw a quick victory. I was half right. The war came. Today I foresee war and a quick victory of the yellow race over the Christian world. I hope again that I may be only half right."

I have written only Gen. Hoffmann's words—not my own. I can add, however, that looked at with American eyes Bolshevism has already crossed the Russian frontier to stay. Not food nor raw material but an army sent into Germany within the next few months will remove it.
