# SHIPWRECKS.

Hurricane Causes Loss of Life and Great Damage—Many Die in Wrecks Along Provincial Coasts—Three Men Drowned on P. E. I. Coast.

RICHBUCTO, N. B., Nov. 7.—An-other day's has passed without the fate of the crew of the wrecked bark Adeona being known. One pilot boat got within three hundred yards of the within three hundred yards of the wreck this morning and could see no sign of life on the wreck. It is a strange fact that every day before Monday, the day the boat was seen to leave, some person could be seen occasionally during the day by Lighthouse Keeper Richard moving on the wreck this morning suys that the houses on deck appeared greatly damaged. One theory is that part of the crew may have been killed by the falling spars or were washed over previous to the departure of the boat on Monday. P. E. I. WRECKS. CHARLOTTETOWN, P. E. I., Nov 7.-Within the past six days four veshorns of the crescent northern coast of the Island, carried out of their course by strong westerly currents and driven by fierce northeast gales, have gone to the shore to become total wrecks amid the breakers. On Friday it was the Turret Bell, stranded at Cable Head, and since condemned. On Saturday the schooner Orpheus went to pieces at Campbell's Cove. Yesterday morning the bark Olga met her fate at Black Bush. Last-night the bark Savindo finished her career at Priest's Pond, all within a distance of twenty miles along the coast. So far six men have been known to have perished and others are in the gravest peril.

The Olga, an iron ship, 1081 tons, left Port Elizabeth, South Africa, September 1st, hound to Carachellian Y. B. er 1st, bound to Campbellton, N.
