WOULD EMULATE CANADA'S LAWS

Sunday Rest Association Impressed by Them.

Rev. J. G. Shearer and Rev. T. Albert

More Return From Convention at Philadelphia.

(Mail and Empire.)

Rev. J. G. Shearer and Rev. T. Albert have returned from Philadelphia, where they attended the meeting of the International Federation of Sunday Rest Associations of America. There were present delegates from New York City, New York State, the New England States, the State of New Jersey, Philadelphia, the State of Pennsylvania, the State of Ohio, Cleveland, the State of Wisconsin, and Canada. The meetings were characterized by perfect harmony and much enthusiasm.

Among the resolutions adopted, in which Canada was deeply interested are the following:

1. This federation congratulates the Parliament and people of Canada for the enactment of the Lord's Day Act, which is recognized as at once the most effective and the most reasonable Sunday law in the world, securing the liberty of the weekly rest day to the largest number possible of Canadian workers; and the federation pledges itself to do all in its power to secure a similar blessing for the people of the other nations of the continent of America, and to direct that a copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Right Honorable the Premier of Canada, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, and to the press.

The second resolution notes with gratitude the movement among druggists in the United States and Canada in the direction of voluntarily refusing to sell on Sunday anything but medicines or sick-room appliances, and to forward the shortening of hours of operation.

WESTERN PULP COMPANY SELLS TO A SYNDICATE

Big Distillery Will Be Built in Winnipeg by an Eastern Combine.

TORONTO, June 5.—It is announced that the sale has been about completed of the Spanish River Pulp and Paper Company's interests to a syndicate with headquarters at Rhineland, Wisconsin, for two million and a half. The company was entitled to select 90 square miles of land along the Spanish, Vermilion, and Onopung rivers. In return they were to pay the province 20 cents a cord for spruce and 10 cents for other woods. They were also to spend \$500,000 in mills and plant and employ 100 hands. The pulp mill has been erected at Webwood and a dam and works have been constructed to generate power from Spanish River waterfall. CONCESSIONS TO END STRIKE.

French Minister of Marine Gives Assurance of Delegation.

PARIS, June 5.—A delegation of the maritime strikers, after interviewing M. Thomson, minister of marine, and the president of the naval committee of the Chamber of Deputies, today telegraphed to all the ports that they had received assurances that no difficulties would be made in the government's pension proposal on condition that the strikers immediately resume their duties.

M. Thomson declared that there would be no prosecutions, and that he would endeavor to secure the reinstatement of the strikers. The delegates advised an immediate cessation of the strike.

BAD FOR MORALS OF THE CHILDREN

New York After Nickel Theaters and Slot Machines

Investigation Shows that the Young Firm Majority of Clients of Such Places.

NEW YORK, June 5.—It is expected that some time this week Mayor McClellan will revoke the licenses of 400 odd nickel theatres and penny-in-the-slot amusements places. For more than two months the police department and the Gerry Society have been making a thorough investigation of these cheap amusement places. In the majority of cases it has been found that the character of the entertainment given is extremely detrimental to the proper moral development of the children who form the greater part of the clientele of such places, and the report which is now in the hands of the head of the police bureau advises that the licenses of the offending show men be revoked. The report may reach the mayor tomorrow. An itemized list of the places visited by investigators included remarks of the conditions existing in each arcade or "theatre." In all the places children were found, numbering in some cases as many as three weeks. An examination of the pictures which they were viewing in the penny machines reveals the fact that many were vulgar and suggestive, while an equally large number were of the blood and thunder type. In Brooklyn, a number of clergymen, headed by the Rev. Floyd Appleton, pastor of a Protestant Episcopal Church, have started an independent crusade against the moving picture shows in that borough. Although their main object is to prevent the managers from running their places on Sunday, the movement will probably lead to an investigation similar to the one conducted in Manhattan. On Friday the clergymen gained their first victory, when several managers were fined for running on Sunday.
