BOSTON, Feb. 23.—Upon four occasions the children of Mrs. Sarah F. Hampton came into the world through the medium of the Caesarian operation Upon the last visit of the stork science added twins to the family. Her case is considered one of the most remarkable in medical history. There is no parallel case where twins have survived the Caesarian method.

The children, both boys and weighing five pounds and five pounds nine ounces, are with their mother in McLean Hospital, an exclusive institution in Boston.

The Hamptons were married eleven years ago, and a year later a girl was born to them, the Caesarian operation being employed. The mother was ill for two years, but in a twelvemonth a second girl was born, science again succeeding. The third baby, a boy, was insured to the couple by the Caesarian method in 1905.

In preparation for the latest event Mrs. Hampton was taken to McLean Hospital, Surgeons and nurses were amazed and filled with professional pride when twins were safely preserv-

pride when twins were safely preserved by the Caesarian operation.
One of the attending physicians said that Mrs. Hampton apparently was normal except that she was afflicted with partial paralysis when her children were expected.
