TEN PER CENT SALARY REDUCTION ON C. N. R.

Montreal, Que., July 28. — Announcement of a reduction in salaries on the Canadian National Railways affecting all salaries in excess of \$3,000 per year during the next ten months from August 1st, was made by Sir Henry W. Thornton, chairman and President of the Canadian National Railways, following a meeting of the Board. The resolution passed by the Board of Directors was as follows: "Resolved that all officers and employees, excepting those whose rates of salaries, following conditions are governed by scheduled agreements, earning in excess of \$3,000.00 per annum shall be reduced by ten per cent for a period of ten months from the 1st August, 1931. At the expiration of this period the deduction herein included shall be restored unless the Board otherwise orders. Be it further resolved that no salary in excess of \$3,000.00 per annum shall, by virtue of such reductions, be reduced below \$3,000.00 per annum."

TWO CHILDREN BADLY HURT IN ACCIDENTS

6 years old boy mangled by moving machine — Young girl breaks her arm after being struck by car. Six-year-old Alyre Michaud, son of Mr. and Mrs. Alme Michaud, living about three miles above Grand Falls, had both feet badly mangled yesterday while in a field with the hired man, who was mowing hay. The child wanted to get on the mowing machine but the man refused. A few minutes later while the man was off the machine the boy went in front of the horses and hit them with a switch or whip, causing them to rush ahead, the cutting bar catching the child's feet and mangle them so badly that Dr. B. A. Puddington was forced to amputate both feet on arrival at the hospital here. The child is doing as well as can be expected. A few minutes later word was sent to a brother, Edmund Michaud, living a short way up the road, and when he backed his car out of his garage he nearly struck a New York car passing by, causing the driver of the latter to swerve, striking Constance Michaud, seven-year-old daughter of Edmund, breaking her left arm near the elbow and bruising her about the chest and hips. She was brought to the hospital here for observation.

MOTOR TRUCK BRINGS TRAFFIC PROBLEMS NORTH

Natives along Hudson Bay Shores Astounded by Arrival of Monster New Vehicle. Churchill, Canada's most northerly port of latitude 59 has the beginning of a traffic problem. Recently there arrived at this historic spot the first motor truck to ramble along the shores of Hudson's Bay. The truck is the property of the Roman Catholic Mission and is being used to freight the supplies from Churchill station to the various missions strung out along the shores of the bay. Eskimos and Indians ran for cover when the truck came ploughing along the trails, but a few of the braver were coaxed to take a ride and they now strut about with a very superior and knowing air. In 1923 when Churchill is officially opened and building commences, there will no doubt be numerous trucks and automobiles in the North ern port, who knows, there might even be a traffic cop.

Payroll Padding Investigation Resumed Monday

Public Work Department Probe to Continue at Balmora. Campbellton, July 28. — After an adjournment of 10 days, the investigation being conducted by the N. B. Department of Public Works into charges made at the last sitting of the Provincial Legislature that road supervisors in Restigouche and Madawaska counties had padded their payrolls and were guilty of other irregularities, resumed at Balmora, Restigouche County, yesterday. The investigation is being conducted by R. P. Hartley, of Sackville, general, E. R. Richard, deputy attorney-general, J. E. Michaud, of Edmundston, in counsel for the department, with J. T. Hebert of Campbellton, appearing for the Opposition, a member of which, J. E. Michaud, of Edmundston, laid the charges. Several of the road supervisors already examined at Fredericton and Balmora, admitted irregularities and promised to make restitution to the department. Those to be examined at Balmora include five road supervisors of Balmora, three at Jacques River, one at Val d'Amour and one bridge inspector. It is not expected the court of inquiry will complete its session until the end of next week at least, as there are between 30 and 40 witnesses yet to be heard, with the probability of rebuttal evidence during the hearing. The investigation is being conducted by J. Allan LeBlanc, of Campbellton, will attend in the interests of Octave LePage, Balmora supervisor.

AUSTRALIAN FRUIT HAS EDIBLE SEEDS

Hope That Canadians Will Learn To Like Old Empire Food. Montreal, July 29. — Passion fruit little known in Canada, is being tried out on Canadian appetites. A consignment of this odd product will reach Montreal this summer aboard the Canadian National freighter Canadian Cruiser, which left Australia some time ago. This fruit is highly nutritious but one must cultivate a taste for it. The size compares with a plum and the general appearance when ready to eat suggests a prune. It contains seeds, which have great food value. The plant belongs to the genus Passiflora. Recently a shipment of passion fruit was sent to New York from Australia. Hotel menus contained the striking hint that one should eat the seeds. Mr. Average American, could not accustom himself to eating seeds and the New York experiment was not successful. However, Australians are hopeful that the passion fruit crop into the hearts and stomachs of Canadians.

NEWS IN BRIEF

30% LB SALMON CAUGHT IN NOVA SCOTIA. Moncton, N. B., July 28th. — A 30% pound salmon measuring forty-three inches in length and twenty inches around has been caught on the West River, Sheet Harbor, N. S. by George McLeod, veteran Indian guide, according to information received here. It is claimed to be the largest fish ever caught in the Musquodoboit district, and with an ordinary salmon rod. A "Black Doctor" (dry fly) and a No. 19 hook were used. McLeod has been guiding fishing parties for over forty years. His next biggest catch was in 1928 when he landed two salmon in succession, one weighing 21½ and the other 23½ pounds.

AL. G. BARNES, CIRCUS OWNER DIES IN CALIFORNIA

Indio, Calif., July 26. — Al. G. Barnes, circus man, died here Saturday. Barnes died at the Community Hospital where he had been ill for months. The famous showman was 69 years old. His real name was Alpheus George Barnes. Showhouse, but it was under the familiar name of Al. G. Barnes that he became the owner, at one time, of one of the largest circuses in the world.

FIRST AID IS TAUGHT IN MOTION PICTURES

Montreal, July 29. —Canadian National employees who study First Aid and undergo the St. John Ambulance Association tests will be assisted in their preparation for usefulness in emergency by motion pictures. A. O. Deek, Chief First Aid Organizer for the System, announces. Three copies are now being made up of a reel on artificial respiration, one of which will be kept in the Central Region, one sent to Winnipeg and one to the Maritimes. The promo pressure method of resuscitation is taught in the Canadian National ambulance classes, and theoretical and practical demonstrations will be made even more valuable by the movie. It pictures the reviving of three men, one overcome by carbon monoxide fumes in his garage, one a victim of electric shock and the third a man who was almost drowned. Diagrams of the human body, showing the action of the lungs and the diaphragm are followed by a demonstration of artificial respiration in practice and of the proper methods of caring for the patients. Great emphasis is laid on the need for hurry in the first place and for well-regulated scientific action in the second.

150 FRENCH TOURISTS TO CANADA

Halifax, N. S., July 28th. — More than 150 tourists from France will visit Canada next month in three organized tours, according to A. M. Kirk, General Passenger Agent, Steamship Traffic, Canadian National Railways, who has completed arrangements for their itinerary. More than fifty will take part in the French Line tours which will arrive at Halifax on the ship "Rocheambeau" on Saturday, August 15. This first party will lunch at the Nova Scotian Hotel, Halifax, and leave later for Quebec and Montreal. In Ottawa they will visit the Parliament Buildings, the Peace Tower and other public showplaces and will lunch at the Chateau Laurier. Visits to Toronto and Philadelphia as well as during the tour will be made before the overseas travellers sail from New York, August 26, on the "De Grasse". The second group will go to Detroit, Chicago, Washington and Philadelphia as well as during the tour will be made before the overseas travellers sail from New York on September 2, on the "Paris". The third tour of "L'Union pour la France", the third group, will bring more than 100 visitors. They will arrive at Halifax on the same steamer as their compatriots and will visit the principal cities of Eastern Canada and the United States.

D. OF ISABELLA 1933 CONVENTION IN MONTREAL

Montreal, Que., July 28th. — More than 1200 delegates from all parts of the United States will assemble in Montreal in July, 1933, when the biennial convention of the Daughters of Isabella is held here. In making the announcement this morning on his return from Boston where this year's convention was held, C. M. Robertson, convention traffic agent for the Canadian National Railways, stated that Montreal was chosen despite the most insistent invitations from many important cities in the United States. Mrs. J. Bernier of Montreal, State Regent for Quebec, who extended Montreal's invitation, brought also an invitation especially from the Archbishop.
