Brutal Fighting in Mexican Revolt

Government Troops Ordered to Take No Prisoners—Complete Deadly Work With Bullet.


Revolutionists Held General Navarro to Standstill in Tuesday's Conflict.

At the Front, Rancho Santiago, near Pedernales, Dec. 12 (via El Paso, Tex., Dec. 14).—In yesterday's engagement the revolutionists fought General Navarro to a standstill, although inferior in numbers. All told 74 prisoners are known by independent investigation to have been killed. Navarro took no prisoners. It being contrary to his orders, and his camp today there were no wounded on the other side. The bayonet had completed the work of the bullet.

A horrible instance of the barbarity of the campaign occurred after the battle. Every man in the hamlet of

Cerro Prieto (Dark Hill) was brought before the mayor to prove his innocence of participation in the revolt. Thirty could not do this. As fast as their identity became known they were taken out and shot. They are included in the number of the dead.

General Navarro places his own dead at one captain, one lieutenant, and twelve soldiers, twenty-seven of his men, including two officers, were severely wounded. Among the latter was General Brandon, special correspondent of the Mexican Herald and a resident of Panama. Five insurgents who ran out of ammunition and surrendered were bayoneted. The battle was indecisive in its results, it began at 11 a. m. and lasted until 4 p. m., and occurred at the village of Cerro Prieto, 100 miles west of Chihuahua, at the base of two low hills, nine miles east and here two hundred revolutionists had occupied the hills during the previous night.

Fire From Distance.

When General Navarro with 450 of his advance guards passed east of the hills, the insurgents opened fire, but did little damage owing to the distance. Later, when the field pieces came up, Navarro shelled them from their positions. The revolutionists retreated slowly, firing from the shelter of Adobo houses which dot the Mesa. At 4 o'clock, their ammunition having run low, they took up a position at the base of a range of low mountains, five miles south-west of Cerro Prieto.

There was no fighting today despite the proximity of the two forces, which in itself indicates a drawn battle. During the fighting Sunday, the original 300 insurgents were reinforced by 230 of their comrades. Two hundred more arrived last night and four hundred more are expected.

In an interview General Navarro stated he expected serious fighting from now on. He admitted that the insurgents were brave, but declared their lack of military organization would defeat them in the end.

It was confirmed in his camp, that government troops were converging on this section from Parral and from Sonora.

News of Victory.

Washington, Dec. 14.—The Mexican joyous news have completely routed the revolutionists in Chihuahua, and captured the city of Guerrero, according to a telegram received today by the state department from Ambassador Wilson at Mexico City.

"This cleared the state of Chihuahua and other parts of the country," said Mr. Wilson, "of all organized resistance to the government."

PARTICULARS OF PEPPARD'S ARREST

Moncton, Dec. 14.—Chief of Police Rideout has received communication from Pinkerton Detective agency telling of the arrest of Peppard in New Jersey. The letter stated he was arrested giving a name of Charles E. Davis at Plainfield, N. J. He is charged with carrying a worthless cheque at a hotel where he was known as C. McDonald. It was learned his correct name was John L. Peppard, and a native of Nova Scotia.

From Moncton where he and his wife lived eight months in 1909, Peppard went to Portland, Oregon, going thence to New Haven. Records at Boston show John L. Peppard was married to Margaret A. Fulton. The groom was born at Great Village, N. S., and the bride at Folley Village, N. S.

Mdme. Sarah Grand On Seasickness

A delegation of boatmen waited on the mayor yesterday and requested the mayor to direct the attention of the council to the need of a new landing slip. The boatmen complained that the construction of the landing stage for the Eastern Steamship Company at Reed's Point, prevented them landing there, as they used to do, and that the slip at the end of Britain street near the I. C. R. trestle was too exposed to be a safe landing place and that their boats when moored there were liable to injury. They asked that the city authorities give them permission to use the slip at the foot of Duke street and the head of McLeod's wharf as a landing place. The mayor promised to bring the matter to the attention of the proper authorities as soon as possible.

RENEW APPEAL FOR CAMPBELLTON CHURCH

Miramichi Presbytery Authorize Rev. Mr. Drumm to Address Congregations Who Have Not Responded

Newcastle, December 14.—Miramichi Presbytery met in St. James' hall yesterday at 11 a. m., Rev. George P. Tatterton, New Carlisle, P. Q., in the Moderator's chair, Rev. M. McLeod, New Mills, clerk. There were no laymen present and on this account the vote on church union was deferred until next meeting, which will be held here on the second Monday of March. Other clergymen present were Revs. John Valentine, Drummond Mines; R. Hensley Staver, Harcourt; J. R. Miller, Bass River; Thos. P. Drumm, Campbellton; W. B. McCallum, New Richmond, P. Q.; S. J. MacArthur, Newcastle; D. Henderson, George Woodard, St. John, N. B.; Chatham; P. C. Simpson, Douglastown; H. J. Fraser, Loggieville; E. E. Mowatt, Redbank; A. Rennie, Millerton, and Catechist Porter, of Blackville.

The following allocations were made for the augmentation funds:—Bass River, \$25; Bathurst, \$40; Black River, \$40; Blackville, \$30; Boston and DeLorge, \$15; Campbellton, \$50; Chatham (St. Andrew's), \$75; Chatham (St. John's), \$45; Dalhousie, \$50; Douglastown, \$25; Escuminac, P. Q., \$30; Kouchibouguie, \$8; Loggieville, \$20; Millerton, \$25; New Brandon, \$12; New Carlisle, P. Q., \$35; Newcastle, \$75; New Mills, \$65; New Richmond, P. Q., \$55; Redbank, \$30; Rexton, \$35; Tabusintac, \$30; Restigouche, \$30; Millbank, \$5; Harcourt, \$25.

Rev. Geo. P. Tatterton withdrew his resignation as pastor of New Carlisle church.

The Campbellton Church. Rev. T. P. Drumm made a statement respecting the Campbellton congregation and thanked the Presbytery for their sympathy and assistance, whereupon the following resolution was passed:—

"Whereas, it appears that there has been a generous response to the appeal on behalf of their greatly afflicted congregation from the Western part of the church, but that the contributions have been small within the bounds of this synod, Presbytery authorizes Mr. Drumm to renew the appeal to the congregations that have not yet responded, and again commend this worthy object to the sympathy of such congregations."

Recommendation was received from the Synod that the minimum stipend be \$450 per annum, and instructing presbytery to take steps as soon as possible to have the needful increase made.

The following were appointed a committee to visit Bartlog, respecting a site for new church there: Revs. James Ross, supt. of missions; J. R. MacKay, Alex. Rennie, F. C. Simpson, Geo. A. Grant (Black River) and J. MacArthur. They were given presbyterial powers to issue the matter and were requested to meet as soon as possible.

The congregation of Earlton, Colchester County, N. S., has extended a call to Rev. J. H. Kirk, of Dalhousie.

A. M. Porter was appointed catechist to Blackville for six months.

Presbytery resolved to make a systematic and thorough visitation of congregations with a view of increasing the gifts for the schemes of the church.
