GIFT FROM THE MARYS

She has Selected Set of In-

signia of Order of Garter

and Pictures of King and

Prince.

New Brunswick subscribers to the Queen Mary fund will be interested in learning the Queen received at Buckingham Palace on Thursday, June 8, a deputation of ladies headed by Lady Mary Trevelyan, who presented to Her Majesty a Coronation gift on behalf of the women who bear the name of Mary, or any synonymous Christian name. Women in all parts of the Empire subscribed to the fund, which amounted to £12,500. When the gift was first suggested last July it was intended that it should be confined to a few of Her Majesty's friends, but so popular did it prove that nearly every woman and girl who bears the name of Mary, May, Maria, Marie, Marian, Marion or Miriam, is represented by a contribution—anything from 1d. to £1. Yorkshire heads the list of counties with 30,000 subscribers. Devonshire comes next with 14,000, and Norfolk follows with 10,000. The Queen has written the following autograph letter in acknowledgment of the gift: "I thank most warmly all the Marys in the Empire who have so generously contributed the gift which has been presented to me. The thought of the affectionate impulse which prompted it has, I can assure you, deeply touched me. The beautiful insignia of the Garter and the pictures of the King and my son, which will form the personal part of the gift will be treasured by me throughout my life, and will be handed down as precious heirlooms to those who come after.
