Washington, Oct. 29.—President Wilson has under consideration a new plan for restoring peace in Mexico, which he will discuss with his cabinet Friday and make it public within a few days. Officials were reticent as to what it contemplated, As the United States has asked not only the European governments, but those of Latin-America and the Orient to withhold the formulation of their policy toward Mexico until the Washington government can make known its plans for dealing with the situation, the solution upon which the president and Secretary Bryan are working is believed to be more than any suggestion heretofore made for the pacification of the southern republic.

SAVE THE YOUNG; LET

Toronto, Oct. 29.—The News tonight publishes a sensational story of a Unionist League having been formed in Toronto with the avowed intention of supplying both men and money for the anti-Home Rule campaign in Ireland. It says the organization has been formed with great secrecy, but already has 1,500 members.

The News says:

"That the movement is no idle one is evidenced by the fact that amongst those said to have enrolled are a number of ex-soldiers whose time on the reserve has expired, and who are therefore no longer on the War Office payrolls. Many of these men have soldiered in garrisons in the north of Ireland, and their knowledge of the topography of the surrounding country, and of local conditions, would prove invaluable should the dogs of civil war be unleashed.

"The movement is not confined to Toronto, but in all of the large centres of the Dominion it is developing great activity. Organization is in an advanced stage in the principle cities from coast to coast."
