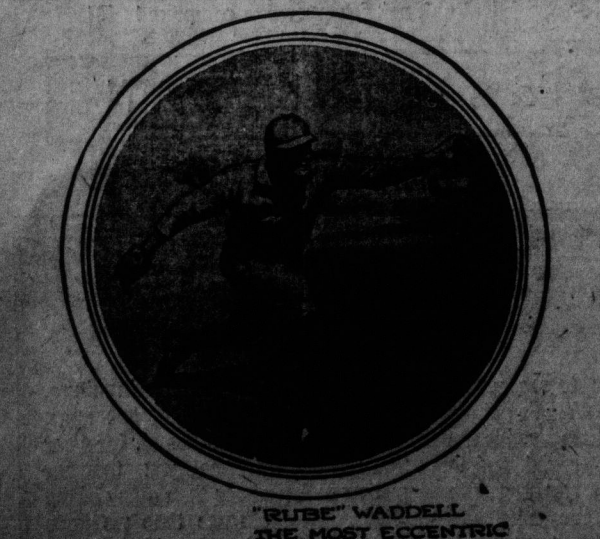

I have lost fifty-four pounds since I was up North. I now weigh only 151. I am very weak and cannot catch twenty feet. I am writing this to you."

MONTREAL BOY
A SUCCESS
AS JOCKEY

Charleston, S. C., Feb. 24.—Johnny Smyth, a fourteen-year-old Montreal boy, is well up amongst the leading riders at the present winter meeting held under the auspices of the Charleston Fair and Racing Association at Palmetto Park. Smyth began his career in the saddle at the close of the meeting at Blue Bonnets, and has shown steady improvement since his debut to the racing public. On that occasion he rode a horse called Spirit, a fifty to one shot and finished second, being beaten by a scant nose.

Smyth has been known in racing parlance a good pair of hands, a fine seat and plenty of nerve, coupled with brains. The boy on several occasions has shown that he is a "finch" rider, and it must be said to his credit that he was never left at the post, in a sprint or over a distance of ground. Above all he is very gentlemanly and unassuming and goes about his riding in a business like manner.

Smyth was born in Malouneuve and attended school under the Christian Brothers of that municipality, but all his holidays were spent at his uncle's stable at Blue Bonnets, where he first became educated in galloping horses, which Johnny Smyth trained for several Montreals. The boy showed aptitude for the work and it was decided by his parents he should become a jockey. He is under first call to Eddie McBride for this meeting and has ridden the horses in that barn.

H. C. Bedwell is very fond of the boy and he generally does all the lightweight riding for the Colorado turfman. He has ridden Parrier in several of his races, and a few weeks back, beat Royal Meteor, a one to three shot, with the much talked of MacTaggart in the saddle. According to experienced horsemen, young Smyth just plainly outrode and outperformed the boy for whom Jefferson Livingston was willing to give \$10,000 a short time ago.

His uncle, Johnny Smyth, has received several tempting offers for the boy's contract, but steadily refuses to sell. Jockey Smyth will be taken from here to Norfolk, thence to Canada and will make his reappearance to a home crowd at the spring meeting at Blue Bonnets, and it is predicted when he returns in the fall he will be ranked amongst the leading plain artists of America.
