

FIGHTING THE WHITE PLAGUE

Charlotte County Patient at River Glade Sanatorium, Tells of Life and Conditions there.

We hear much of the anti-tuberculosis movement in various parts of the world, and people are gradually becoming educated regarding the laws of sanitary living, through the medium of free literature, dispensaries, lectures and the like, and yet a large proportion are deplorably ignorant of the primal laws of health.

A long felt need in our province of a good sanatorium has at last been met in the erection of the Jordan Memorial Sanatorium at River Glade, Westmorland county. Here we have a modern institution that New Brunswick may well be proud of, for the treatment of favorable cases of tuberculosis of the lungs, in the early stages.

At River Glade scientific treatment is combined with pleasant and comfortable accommodations, the daily life of the patient is carefully regulated as to exercise, rest and diet, to suit the individual case. The food is selected and arranged so as to increase the resistance power of the patient and is based on scientific principles.

The location is very favorable for the "cure" being in a protected spot, secluded yet within easy reach of transportation. At present there are three pavilions, each accommodating ten patients and all constructed on sanitary lines and with the special object of facilitating proper outdoor treatment. The dining room is a recreation room in the main building are large and airy and the big open fireplaces lend a homelike aspect, not always to be found in like establishments. The sanatorium is surrounded by spacious grounds and commands a pleasant view from all points.

The position of superintendent and physician of such an institution is indeed no sinecure and requires executive ability, judgment and medical skill, yet this position is ably filled in the person of Dr. David Townsend, an experienced specialist in tuberculosis.

The staff of nurses at the Jordan Sanatorium also truly deserve a place in the hearts of their patients by the way in which they demonstrate the nobleness of their profession.

While the home treatment of tuberculosis has many advantages, it is generally recognized that the constant supervision of the patient, which sanatorium life affords, is absolutely indispensable to effect a permanent cure. It is usually impossible to maintain at home, unless the patient has had previous sanatorium treatment.

There is a certain inspiration obtained from fellow patients, from their sympathy, their optimistic spirit of enthusiasm which refuses to be discouraged, even when fighting a most deadly foe, day by day, hour by hour, an inspiration that can only be understood and appreciated by those who have experienced sanatorium life.

It is found that patients, with few exceptions, prefer remaining out of doors whenever possible, and they enjoy sleeping in the open air even when the temperature is very low. There is an effect of exhilaration and buoyancy in the very open air, the tendency to chase away the blues; it is a mental as well as a physical stimulus.

We hope that the time is coming when there will be free and compulsory examination of pupils in our public schools by a physician competent through specialisation, to detect the disease in its incipient stages, that expectation in public thoroughfares will be a punishable offence, and that the citizens of every community will demand hygienic conditions in their surroundings.

RECENT CHARTERS.

Articles were opened Monday at Portland for the barque Belfast, for St. John, N. B., and back to a southern lumber port.

CAPTAIN HAD SHOCK.

Word was received at Portland on Monday that Captain Petrie, master of the British steamer Astoria, had a shock Saturday afternoon on board his vessel, which at the time was about 100 miles off Rockland, for which port she was bound, coming from Louisburg, C. B. He was stricken on the white of the bridge and had not recovered consciousness at last accounts, a fatal result being feared.

THE POTOMAC.

Newfoundland fishermen are reluctant to let the United States naval tug Potomac sail in the Gulf of St. Lawrence without an effort to capture the prize, and Monday two men started alongshore with pumps which they hope to place on board should the tug show signs of sinking. When last reported the Potomac was six miles off Parson's Lake with water in her hold, and local fishermen declare that relief must come before the big ice jam, which usually takes place in the Straits of Belle Isle early in April. The tug Wren Gulf has been equipped with wrecking apparatus, and will endeavor to reach the Potomac as soon as the ice shows signs of breaking up.

LINEERS MADE MONEY.

(Shipping Illustrated.)

The annual report of the United Steamship Co. (Head Line), Ltd., Belfast, for the year ending January 31, 1914, shows that the net earnings of the company's steamers amount to £24,282 15s. 7d. The net balance to credit of profit and loss, after payment interest on deposits, income tax, etc., is £21,175 12s. 4d. An ad interim dividend at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum for the half-year was paid in August last, leaving a balance of £7,550 12s. 4d. From this amount the directors have applied £3,441 16s. 4d. as depreciation for the year, and appropriated £2,000 as provision for future income tax, leaving £2,109 16s. 4d. out of which they propose to pay a further dividend at the rate of 5 per cent. per annum for the past six months, making 5 per cent. for the year, fee of income tax, leaving a balance of £2,350 17s.

MOLASSES CHARTERS.

Portland Arrives: Two cargoes of molasses will be landed here this spring by vessels coming from Barbados, the charters of two British schooners being announced. One of them, the Margaret G., sailed from a Gulf port on Jan. 25 with a cargo of lumber for St. Vincent, Cape Verde, and from there will proceed to Barbados to load, probably reaching here some time in April. The other schooner is the Adonis, which arrived at Las Palmas on Feb. 27 from St. John's, B. W. with lumber, and is also due here the coming month. The Margaret G.
