## CHAMPIONS WHO MEET AT DETROIT "TY" COBB COMPLETES HIS TENTH YEAR WITH DETROIT

Detroit, Aug. 30.—In their excitement over the hot fight the Tigers are making for the pennant, Detroit fans almost—but not quite—forgot that Tyrus Raymond Cobb, star center fielder and idol of the baseball word, completed ten years of service with the Tigers on Saturday last. The occasion was marked by no special ceremony other than the presentation to the famous Georgian of a huge bouquet of American beauty roses.

Cobb, however, punctuated his anniversary performance with several spectacular plays, and ended the afternoon by scoring the winning run for his side in an overtime game which had kept the 12,000 spectators on their toes for three hours. Usually a major leaguer after ten years of service is beginning to show signs of wear, but Cobb is today, if anything, more brilliant than at any previous time in his career.

Has Never Hit Below .300.

The marvellous Georgian has played nine full seasons with Detroit, getting into only 41 games in 1905, his first year. In these nine complete campaigns he has never failed to hit well over .300, his lowest mark being .320 in 1906 and his highest .420 in 1911.

He has topped the American league batters since 1907, and is sure to do again this season, making a total of nine years of leadership, a record in season player. In addition to his prowess with the fiall, he has led the league in stolen bases several times and always has ranked among the most brilliant fielders.

It is impossible to overestimate what Tyrus has done for baseball in Utrout. Largely because of his won-derful work with the club he has been factor in almost every pennant race foined, winning three pennants in that time and finishing in the second division but twice since 1906.
