Detroit, Aug. 30.—In their excitement over the hot fight the Tigers are making for the pennant, Detroit fans almost—but not quite—forgot that Ty Cobb, star center fielder and idol of the baseball world, completed ten years of service with the Tigers on Saturday last.

Has Never Hit Below 300. The marvellous Georgian has played nine full seasons with Detroit, getting into only 41 games in 1905, his first year.

Zimmerman, Harrisburg, and J. Smith, Montreal, tied with .307.

Buffalo leads in club batting, with .275. The leading pitchers are: Dowd of Montreal, 12 wins and 4 losses; Beebe, Buffalo, 20 and 7; Oeschner, Providence, 17 and 6; Comstock, Providence, 15 and 6; Miller, Montreal, 14 and 7; and Luque, Toronto, 10 and 5.

The ten leading National league batsmen are: Snyder, St. Louis, .325; Doyle, New York, .323; Luders, Philadelphia, .319; Daubert, Brooklyn, .312; Merkle, New York, .307; Groh, Cincinnati, and Robertson, New York, tied with .306; Long, St. Louis, .300; Collins, Pittsburgh, .296; J. Smith, Boston, and Saler, Chicago, tied with .295.

Cobb, Detroit, still leads the American league with .388, followed by Speaker, Boston, .330; E. Collins, Chicago, .321; Fournier of Chicago, Meigs, Philadelphia, and Crawford, Detroit, tied with .316; Jackson, Chicago, .315; Maisei, New York, .303; Lewis, Boston, .302; Kavanaugh, Detroit, .300.

Tie in the Federal League. Maese, Brooklyn, and Kauff, his teammate, are tied with .340 for the lead among the batters of the Federal League. Konetsky, Pittsburgh, and Fischer, Chicago, are tied for second place with .315, and Deal, St. Louis, and Plack, Chicago, are tied for third with .314.

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GOLFERS AMAZE THE BALL FANS

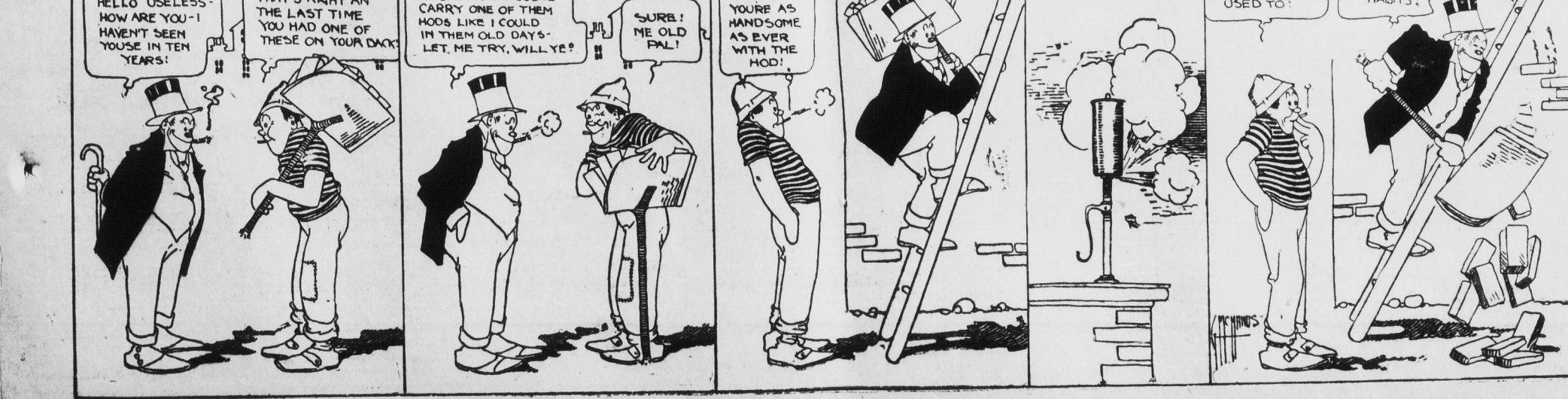
