Toronto, June 7.—Organic union with the Methodist and Congregational churches was approved by the Presbyterian General Assembly of Canada today by a vote of 414 to 107 The result was little different from the vote on union taken at the Winnipeg assembly in 1916, when the returns were 406 to 90 in favor of union. The first vote on the question of union, taken at Edmonton at 1911 was also in favor of union, but was not so decisive as the later votes.
