DECLARE MRS. CLOSE'S SCHEME FOR PAUPER CHILDREN EXCELLENT

Leading Englishmen in London Meeting Give It Hearty Support.

TELLS OF HOME SHE HAS ESTABLISHED HERE

Infant Committee Formed to Further the Movement - Duke of Argyll and Sir Charles Tupper, Brigadier Howell and Others Spoke Enthusiastically of the Project.

One of the greatest problems which confronts those responsible for the administration of the poor law in this country is the question of how best to deal with pauper children.

The present systems are both wasteful and unsatisfactory. The rearing of children in workhouses has long been condemned, and the large institutions, or what are called "barrack schools," though an advance on the former, leave much to be desired.

The scheme of boarding out children into country homes, which would give them the influence of home life, most excellent in theory, has been found inadequate, owing to the difficulty of finding suitable families with whom to put the children.

Mrs. Close's scheme, which combines the most attractive elements, which combine the improvement of the training and surroundings of the children, and a substantial relief to the rates, is, in short, emigration.

She proposes that the guardian should be empowered to purchase or hire a number of small farms in Canada, or in any of our colonies, these farms to be capable of receiving fifteen to twenty children, who would be in charge of two or three parents, who have been placed on the farm.

She proposes that the children should be educated at the ordinary elementary schools provided by the Canadian government for their own people, and they should make themselves useful upon the farms, the girls and boys having suitable accounts of their own, and the children reaching the age of fourteen or sixteen they should have the choice to return to England to seek situations or to settle in the colony.

Not only has Mrs. Close advanced this scheme, but she has already in a small way put it into effect. Through the kindness of Mrs. Riffel, who gave £100, the Duke of Argyll, and others, she has been enabled to purchase a farm in New Brunswick of the colony.

At a well attended meeting at her residence, Eaton square, yesterday afternoon, a meeting was held to discuss the scheme. The Duke of Argyll presided, and was supported by Admiral Sir F. Ponsonby, Sir Henry and Lady Cunningham, Princess Lovina, Sir H. Pringle, and the Duke of Devonshire, and many others.

Dr. Shewell, who has actively interested himself in the scheme, explained its objects, and pointed out that there were in England 21,000 children in workhouses or similar institutions, who cost on an average £290 each.

Mrs. Close said that the farm which she had purchased was twelve miles from St. I. Walden, in New Brunswick. The climate was healthy, and the temperature about the same as in Devonshire. The farm was 185 acres in extent, eighty of which were woodland and 100 suitable for growing vegetables and fruit.

The house had ten large rooms, and there were large barns adjacent. In charge of the farm there was a committee of local ladies and gentlemen, consisting of four gentlemen and three ladies. They received the funds, and kept the books, and generally managed the business side of the question.

The profits from the farm would be devoted to reducing the cost of the maintenance of the children, and to the purchase of land for about 222 a child for the first year, and they expected in the course of a few years that the farm would pay all expenses.
