"And it is further resolved that the report of this committee shall be the interim report presented to Parliamentt February 2nd, 1928 at the second session of the sixteenth parliament, together with the final report as adopted today, and also a copy of the reports of the Auditor General as presented to Parliament."

This concluded the business and the Chairman in a few happy remarks referred to the unity of action which had characterized the deliberations of the committee. The committee itself was representative of all parts of the country and of all classes and creeds. From its first meeting it had faced the problem of organizing the celebration with singleness of purpose and the unanimity that characterized its decisions represented the general feeling of the country and made possible the great success that was attained. The Chairman hoped that this spirit of unity would continue to grow throughout the country. He desired to express the hearty thanks of the committee to provincial governments and to all who were associated in the work throughout Canada. He was satisfied that the impression that had been made on the school children would be a lasting one and that through the children in the settlements of newcomers throughout the West the parents had been brought to feel that they were really Canadians and had a part in our national life.

Mr. Moore referred to the splendid work of the Chairman and endorsed the suggestion previously made that at the final meeting of the Corporation some record should be made of the distinguished services of both the Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

The meeting then adjourned.

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
