

military interests and experiences for any great usefulness in times of peace; but Talbot Papineau was a man of power and influence before the war called him, and had not developed further on the stricken field the qualities which marked him for a great career in his profession and to public.

"The only consolation for a loss like this, and it is one which is difficult to realize when the loss is fresh, lies in the hope that by the very nobility and splendour of his sacrifice to an uncompromising ideal of duty, the late Major Papineau's memory may in years to come effect more for the unification of his country and the triumph of his principles than his own lifelong effort could have accomplished. They who die for their country live no longer, like us who still walk the earth, in a single body with a single tongue to give its imaginings utterance; they live in the hearts of all who love that same country, and their ideals and their yearnings animate the tongues and hands of millions. While Canada lasts, the name of Talbot Papineau, her tragic young hero, will not be forgotten."
