ROYALTY REACH REGINA WARM WELCOME WAITING

Journey Through the Great Western Wheat Belt—Spectacular Events of Tour—Great Assembly of Indian Tribes.

Regina, N. W. T., Sept. 27.—Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Cornwall and York only spent six hours in Winnipeg, but into that period they compressed a large amount of the work that royalty is called upon to perform. Leaving the capital of the Prairie Province at 5.30 last evening, after a day spent in receiving and making addresses, the two royal trains sped towards Regina, where they arrived early this morning, passing Brandon at 1.34 a. m. and 2.37 a. m. respectively.

Upon the arrival of the royal train the usual enthusiastic reception was accorded and an imposing procession took place to Government House. At half past 12 loyal addresses were presented and replied to, and decorations conferred upon a large number of South Africa veterans, including many members of the mounted police. At 1 o'clock the royal party were entertained at luncheon at Government

House, and at 3 o'clock their Royal Highnesses again embarked upon their train and proceeded towards Calgary, where they will arrive at 8.30 to-morrow morning, and where the most spectacular events of their western tour will take place. At this place the Northwest Mounted Police will be inspected, medals will be presented, and a great assembly of Indian tribes will welcome the heir apparent and his wife. The day will close with a typical North-western celebration, including steeplechasing, rough bronco breaking and cowboy races, the departure taking place at 4.15 p. m. for Vancouver. Their Royal Highnesses since leaving Winnipeg have had an opportunity of seeing the great western wheat fields, though they have not seen it under the most picturesque conditions, as the waving wheat of a few weeks ago is now either in shock or has been threshed and stored in the elevators. Still the royal party were able to see enough of the western prairies to enable them to appreciate their enormous extent and fertility, and were immensely pleased with the prospect.

TEXT OF THEIR TROUBLES PRESENTED BY BURGHERS

Their Appeal to Court of Arbitration at the Hague—Charges Made Against England—Rules of Warfare.

New York, Sept. 27.—Charles D. Pierce, representative in the United States of the defunct Orange Free State, has received a copy of the appeal made by the Boers to the administrative council of the permanent court of arbitration at The Hague. The appeal, which is dated The Hague, Sept. 10, says in part:—

"Now that this war has gone on for nearly two years without any prospect of an end thereto, except in the way only recently acknowledged as being the most efficacious, and at the same time the most equitable means of deciding international differences, to wit, submission to arbitration. The desirability, mutually, for such a peaceful termination cannot but become more and more acknowledged. The states represented by the undersigned therefore consider that they should repeat the proposal already made by them before the war, but rejected by England, to submit to arbitration the settlement of the differences which gave rise to the war. In this way particularly we have in view the question whether England is right in alleging that any action was taken by the republic which had for its object the suppression of the English element in or its expulsion from South Africa, and generally whether the republics have made themselves guilty of any act which, according to internationally recognized principles, would give England the right to deprive them of their independence. The undersigned moreover allege

that England already at the outbreak of the war commenced and has ever since continued to act in contravention of the rules of war between civilized powers as generally, and also by England acknowledged and solemnly confirmed by The Hague convention of 29th July, 1864, concerning the laws and usages of war by land, and more particularly in contravention of the following articles of the said rules to wit: 4, 5, 7, 12, 15, 16, 23 (and thereof the subsections C, D, E, F, G, H, I, J, K, L, M, N, O, P, Q, R, S, T, U, V, W, X, Y, Z, and 55, which England has moreover quite recently by proclamation issued by Field Marshal Lord Kitchener at 1901, virtually notified that she intended to take action in contravention of article 29 also. "The Governments of the states represented by the undersigned are fully prepared, as soon as an opportunity thereof shall be afforded them, to substantiate the allegations herein made by setting forth and proving the particular facts to which they refer. Since England sees fit to deny this continuing violation of the laws of warfare, the states represented by the undersigned consider that they may also in regard to the differences seek a decision of the permanent court of arbitration. Should the English Government give an unfavorable reply it will thereby be manifest that they dare not submit themselves to the judgment of a conscientious, leant and impartial tribunal. "The appeal is signed by W. J. Lloyds, A. Fischer, A. D. W. Wolmarans, plenipotentiaries of the Orange Free State, and A. Fischer, C. H. Wessels, plenipotentiaries of the Orange Free State."

WRECKS

Two Ugly Railroad Disasters—Wabash Passenger Train Smashed.

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 27.—A through passenger train on the Wabash from St. Louis to Omaha, was wrecked to-day eleven miles southeast of Council Bluffs. The entire train, consisting of mail and baggage cars, two day coaches, a chair car and a Pullman sleeper, rolled down an 18-foot embankment, the engine alone remaining on the track. The engine stopped with the forward trucks on the edge of the bridge over Indian Creek. The train carried nearly a hundred passengers. Three people were perhaps fatally hurt and six others received minor bruises.

The badly hurt are:—Conductor Arthur F. Wilson, Council Bluffs; Mrs. George Rye, Silver City, Iowa; infant daughter of A. H. Wilson, Tekamah, Neb. A score of others were more or less injured. Some were taken to the hospital at Council Bluffs and others were brought to this city this evening. The cause of the wreck is thought to be the spreading of the rails.

AN UNACCOUNTABLE ACCIDENT.

Plymouth, Mich., Sept. 27.—A pulsed horse car was shunted on the siding of the Marquette to-day. It overturned, killing two valuable horses and injuring two others, so that they had to be killed. Besides the horses some men, women and some boys were in the car. H. King, a boy, had his arm broken. Others of the party escaped with slight injuries. The car was en route from Fort Erie to Cincinnati. The accident cannot be accounted for.

HANGED OCT. 25

Joseph Leplaine, the Montreal Murderer, Found Guilty.

Montreal, Que., Sept. 27.—Joseph Leplaine, who some months ago shot and killed his boarding mistress, Mrs. Lafabre, with whom he was in love, was yesterday afternoon found guilty of murder in the court of Queen's Bench. When the court opened this afternoon the court room was crowded, all the corridors being filled with people. Among those present were the mother and sisters of the prisoner. He was sentenced to be hanged on Oct. 25. At the conclusion of the judge's words, in passing sentence, the mother of the prisoner broke into convulsed sobs, and had to be helped out of court.

KITCHENER SORE

Rumors of Breach with Broderick are Confirmed.

London, Sept. 27.—The Pall Mall Gazette this afternoon confirms the rumor received by the Daily News to-day of the differences between Lord Kitchener and the war secretary, Mr. Broderick, and adds that, as a result, Mr. Broderick has had a long interview with the King.

The Pall Mall Gazette declares it is in a position to say that Lord Kitchener is dissatisfied with the partial enforcement of martial law in South Africa, wanting it proclaimed at Cape Town and elsewhere. He desires more serious penalties for rebellion and better reinforcements. Lord Kitchener took over the command with the explicit understanding that his hands were not to be tied, but as this condition was not carried out "he is seriously reconsidering his position."

WAR CHEST FULL

Britain has Money to Pay all Boer War Bills till February.

London, Sept. 27.—Three Ministers attended the King's Council yesterday, but it was a formal function and offered no justification for rumors that there would be an autumnal session of Parliament for replenishing the war chest. Campaign expenses have been provided for until the end of January, and there is nothing to indicate any intention to despatch reinforcements on a large scale.

A CAMPAIGN OF CALUMNY.

The Berlin correspondent of the Times quotes an editorial in Kreuz Zeitung, describing the campaign of calumny waged by a section of the German press in regard to the British operations in South Africa as the expression of "the universal indignation of the continental press at the brutalities perpetrated against Boer women and children." The same paper protests against comparing the German methods in 1870-71 with the British methods in South Africa. The correspondent remarks that if German pro-Boer organs desire to give the German public an opportunity to be impartial, let them publish German military proclamations of 1870 side by side with the proclamations of Kitchener.

LANARKSHIRE ELECTION.

Exceptional interest has been taken in the Lanarkshire election. As a result of the splitting of the opposition vote, a Unionist candidate is returned for the first time in the history of the constituency. The Liberal party is now more disunited than ever.
