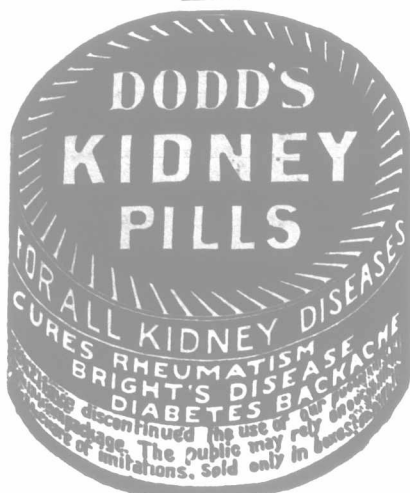

RECORD OF PERFORMANCE TESTS.

While the extremely dry autumn, with a consequent scarcity of fodder, has compelled the withdrawing of a few herds of cows in Eastern Ontario and Quebec from the Record of Performance tests, the entries from the western counties of the former Province continue to come in, says J. B. Spencer, Acting Live-stock Commissioner, in the November issue of the Census and Statistic Monthly. Most of the recent applications that have been received are for Holstein-Friesians, and several of the candidates are making excellent records. A mature cow, from an Elgin County herd, gave in six months ending October 31st, about 12,300 lbs. milk, containing 360 lbs. of fat, equal to more than 400 lbs. of butter. This is the highest record yet made in our work for six months. A two-year-old heifer that recently concluded her milking period of 310 days, gave 9,866 lbs. of milk, containing more than 300 lbs. of fat, equal to about 350 lbs. of butter. A mature cow, owned near Toronto, that recently finished her year, produced 17,619 lbs. of milk, containing 657 lbs. of fat, equal to 776 lbs. of butter. As such records as these, verified by the Department of Agriculture, are published in official reports and herdsbooks, persons desiring to secure sires to improve their herds will have an excellent opportunity of ascertaining where these may be found.

Messrs. Brown Bros., Lyn, Ont., write: "One of the most important of recent sales made from the Lyndale herd of Holsteins is that of the young bull, Sara Jewel Hengerveld's Son, to Mr. Jas. A. Caskey, Madoc, Ont. This calf, as his name indicates, is a son of Sara Jewel Hengerveld, who is sired by Pietertje Hengerveld Count De Kol. This bull has 71 A. R. O. daughters, and is the only bull of the breed to sire two daughters with records of over 32 lbs. butter each in 7 days. He is also sire of the world's champion milk cow, De Kol Creamelle, with a record of 119 lbs. milk in 1 day, and 10,017 lbs. in 100 days, while Sara Jewel Hengerveld holds the Canadian milk record, she having given in official test, 100.4 lbs. milk in 1 day, and 685 lbs. in 7 days, which contained 28.12 lbs. butter. Our herd now numbers about 60 head. Among this number are three cows, each a Canadian champion in her class: Sara Jewel Hengerveld 3rd, 30.39 lbs. butter in 7 days; Sara Jewel Hengerveld, 100.4 lbs. milk in 1 day, 685 lbs. in 7 days; Inka Josephine Abbecker, 15.30 lbs. butter in 7 days, 8½ months after freshening, and within 3½ months of again freshening. This is the largest record ever made in Canada, and the third largest ever made by any cow of the breed 8 months or more after calving."

D. W. Black, of Lyndon, O., was engaged in viewing the car lots of fat cattle at the Chicago International when an acquaintance encountered him. "Where's your cattle located, Dan?" he asked. "Have none here," replied the Ohioan. "What!" "That's what I remarked," replied Black. "What's more, I am out of the cattle business entirely. It's sheep for mine." "Gone back to that, have you?" "Well, that's what a cattleman would naturally say, but I'm satisfied. Come over to the sheep house and let me show you a load of stuff I'm proud of." It is all true. Black is growing lambs and shearing wool. He was "put right," he says, by "Uncle Dick" Stone, who stocked him up with Oxford rams. His ewes—he has 1,400 of them—are grade Merino stock, bought in the North west, and he is prepared to elevate his right hand and take oath that each and every one of them earned \$6 this year, at least that is the average return. "You get two crops in this game," said Dan. "Wool and lambs, and you don't experience the necessity of mortgaging the farm to get money to buy grain to make them ready for market. It is a grass proposition, mainly. Of course, success involves care and a little 'know how.' Sheep will not prosper under a policy of neglect, but treat 'em right and they'll respond."—Live-stock Report.
