Fred Goyer, the Belleville hurler, had 27 strike-outs to his credit-a record number in big league or bush league ball so far as anyone locally is aware. Oulette, his opponent, had thirteen strike-outs, a goodly

number in any game, but he obviously had more support from breeze in Wednesday's contest: his team-Freddy did not need so much help, carrying most of First the load himself.




