TRAFALGAR DAY TODAY is the 110th anniversary of the most outstanding event in British history, the Battle of Trafalgar, which was fought on the 21st October, 1805, and resulted in a British victory, annihilating for a time the French and Spanish fleets, relieving England of fear of invasion, and placing the British navy in a position of uncontested supremacy which it has ever since maintained to hold.

PROGRESS OF THE WAR (October 12 to October 18) THE past week has been an eventful one in the annals of the war, especially so from the fact of Bulgaria having become a belligerent therein; and, excepting only in Serbia, the results of the week's hostilities were eminently satisfactory to the Allies.

RECAPTURE OF ESCAPED GERMAN PRISONER Gustav Hartung, the German who escaped a year ago from the place of internment of enemy aliens in Halifax, N. S., was arrested in St. John on Saturday as he was about to sail on the schooner L. A. Plummer. He had maps, charts and other incriminating documents in his trunk. He was sent to Halifax, to be dealt with by the authorities there.

DOMINION TRUST COMPANY It is stated by Vancouver, B. C., papers that the Dominion Trust Co. was on the verge of bankruptcy in the middle of May, 1914, and only saved itself temporarily from financial doom by using investment funds sent in by Hon. Chas. Dalton of Prince Edward Island. This is being alleged in his suit for the recovery of \$85,000 from the company. Mr. Dalton is asking for a tracing judgment to trace his moneys—or a portion of them—into investments, and is asking the court to order a transfer of title in these investments from the Dominion Trust Company to himself. This is the first effort of the kind made as yet in the whole course of the Dominion Trust liquidation, and is said to be the only instance where there seems to be any likelihood of a client being able to follow his trust funds through the bank account and the books of the

damage done no account is forthcoming, but it was said not to be serious. During the week a success of the Anglo-French troops in the Cameroons was reported, bringing the final resistance of the Germans in that colony nearer to its close.

NEW COMMISSION ON RESOURCES OF CANADA Ottawa, Oct. 17.—The Government appointed on Tuesday last a new commission, whose duties will be to take stock of Canadian natural resources, and to investigate and report such problems as those of rail and water transportation, and marketing, immigration, increased production, the placing of soldiers after the war, co-operative systems, farmers' credits, unemployment, etc. It is, in short, a general purpose commission, which is called upon to solve nearly all the problems now before the government. The commission was promised to the House of Commons by the government in the new commission, with the following other gentlemen as members: St. J. B. Rowland, of Montreal; Wm. Smith, for South Ontario; Dr. G. Rutherford, formerly dominion veterinary general and lately with the Canadian Pacific Railway Company; J. C. Waters, president of the Trades and Labor Congress; William Warrall, of Victoria; C. A. Hopkins, of Moose Jaw; J. W. Flett, of Toronto; and Senator W. B. Ross, of Nova Scotia.

Spencer, who spoke from the words "My soul is exceedingly sorrowful even unto death."
