

Hours for Sprinkling Lawns

WATER WORKS BY-LAW NO. 1, CLAUSE 18, relating to the Sprinkling of Lawns and Gardens:

No person or persons shall be allowed to sprinkle or use in any manner whatsoever, the water supplied by the Board of Water Commissioners, upon Lawns, Gardens; Yards or Grounds of any description, except between the hours of six and eight-thirty o'clock p.m., on Lawns up to and including 5,000 square feet; on Lawns over finitely o'clock p.m., and any person wishing to use the water on their Lawns or Gandens in the morning in place of the evening may do so between the hours of six and eight o'clock a.m., by giving notice to that effect in writing to the Secretury.
