Ends Life In Hotel Room

North Bay, May 29. —John Henry
Creery, lumber inspector, of Sell-
wood, formerly of Toronto, died at
the Queen's Hotel, Sudbury, very
suddenly. A paper, which had con-
tained strychnine, was found in his
room, and an inquest will be held.
Winnifred Wrangham, five years
old, of Cartier, died at Sudbury Hos-
pital from burns received at a bonfire
at the home of her parents.

Fred Villeneuve, barber, of Chelms-
ford, was struck by a C. P. R. train
and killed while walking on the
track near Sudbury.

Fire in Amherst Causes \$25,000 Damage

Blaze Starts in Vacant Building. — Large
Apartment House and C. C. Black's Resi-
dence Falls Prey to Flames.

Amherst, June 1.—At 1:30 this
morning, one of the most spectacular
and disastrous fires that has occurred
in Amherst for some time broke
out in an unoccupied building for-
merly owned by the Maritime Coal,
Railway and Power Company, on
Electric Street. This is totally de-
stroyed and the electric light station
is a total wreck.

The fire spread to the large board-
ing house, known as the Glen house,
also known as the Holmes property.
This, however, was got under control
without considerable damage. Other
buildings on the other side of Church
Street and also on Electric Street
caught fire on the roof of the Victor
bakery on Raichford street, a long
distance from the fire, caused by
sparks. One time it looked as if the
whole business section between
Havelock and Church streets, of
the town were in danger, but the
almost miraculous efforts of the fire-
men and splendid supply of water
kept it confined to this section.

The loss by fire will be over \$25,-
000. At this writing it is impossible
to ascertain the amount of insurance.

A three department building, owned
by C. C. Black is now on fire and
by the look of the building at pre-
sent it is doomed. Only a small
amount of insurance is carried.

The city is in complete darkness
and the numerous industries of
Amherst will be completely crippled
for the day unless a shift is speedily
made into the power plant from the
main plant at Chignecto.
